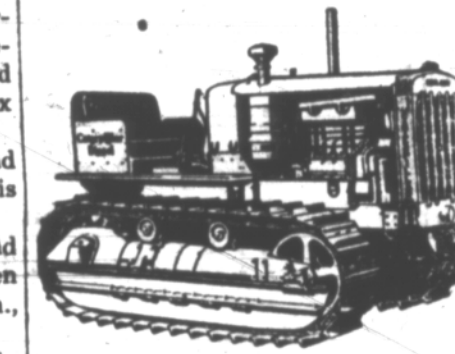
Mrs. Wesley Wilde and son Billy returned home Monday from Stanfield following a visit of a week at the home of her parents.
