1907 school in the White School house was discontinued. The school house was still in excellent condition since it had been carefully built and with good lumber and Will Guyton purchased it and moved it to his farm in 1909 which is in the Macken canyon, about 4 miles from its former site.

It was moved on four wagons and was quite an engineering feat to get it down the steep grade. However they removed the rear wagons and allowed the timbers to drag and let the building slide slowly down the hill. The sliding

tracks can still be seen. The school house was built over, porches were added and it was made into an attractive farm house which has been occupied ever since by Mr. and Mrs. Will Guyton and family.
