Of interest to all counties which might be considering new court houses is an institution by Attorney General Van Winkle this week in connection with the proposal for financing construction of a new court house in Marion county...

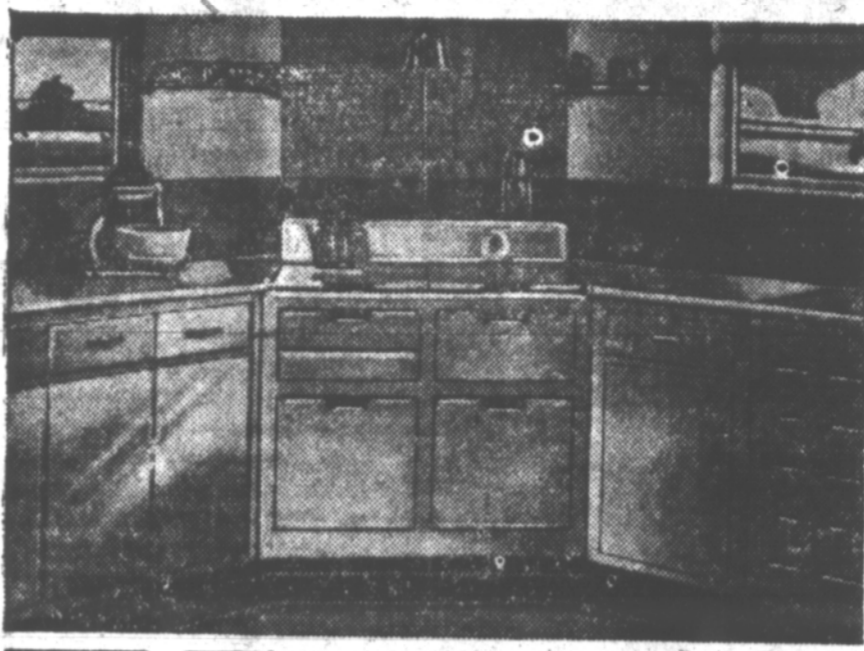
