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OREGON TRAFFIC DEATHS

A Series of Weekly Articles on the Problem of Highway Safety by Earl Snell, Secretary of State

Approximately a quarter of a million Oregon motor vehicle operators have applied to my office during the past thirty days for a renewal of their drivers' licenses. It is expected that another hundred thousand applications will be received during the present month, and that all of these licenses will be in the hands of the applicants before the first of August.

Proper handling of this work constitutes a considerable problem, as well as being an important factor in safety work. The actual writing and mailing of the license cards is a comparatively small matter, but to see that they are placed only in the hands of people who are able to meet the requirements considered necessary for safe driving involves a large amount of checking and personal investigation. This constitutes a responsibility that I am conscientiously trying to meet, and at the same time give as prompt service as possible.

Defective vision, lack of knowledge of the motor vehicle laws, inability to properly handle a car and many other reasons compel the license division to reject hundreds of applicants, in the interest of safety. Proper licensing of drivers is a heavy responsibility, but only through a strict compliance with the law is it possible for the department to do its part in helping to eliminate Oregon's traffic deaths.

Eugene Pioneer Pageant In Preparation

Al the gay color, vivid excitement, and stirring drama of the great pioneer West is being relived in a twentieth century atmosphere as the citizens of Lane county adopt the colorful clothes and quaint customs of our forefathers in preparation for the fourth Oregon Trail Pageant celebration to be held in Eugene on July 22, 23, and 24.

Beards flourish, men have donned picturesque pioneer costumes—beaver hats, boots, red shirts; women are wearing calico gowns and bonnets, as the whole community lives again the exciting days of 1848.

The entire state is "chaining up" with the spirit of the Oregon pioneer in an effort to make the pageant attract world-wide attention. Evidence that it is already internationally famous was revealed in a letter to Pageant headquarters this week from Roll and G. Wild, who stated that he will cover the celebration for The People, Odhams Press, of London, England—a publication of over three million circulation.

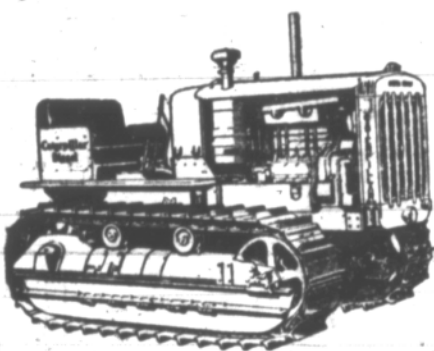
Plans are now under way for the selection of Queen Susannah IV, who will rule over the Pageant. The queen will be selected by the mayors of Lane county's cities at a celebration in Eugene on July 10. Entries are being received from all parts of the state in the contest to choose a Baby Queen who will share regal duties at the celebration with Queen Susannah. Descendants of Oregon's early settlers in any part of the state, between the ages of five and seven years, are eligible for the contest.

Nearly every large city in Oregon will be visited within the next three weeks by a 20-man Junior Chamber of Commerce drill team dressed in authentic Pioneer garb and will receive a special invitation to participate in the state of Oregon's greatest epic of the West.

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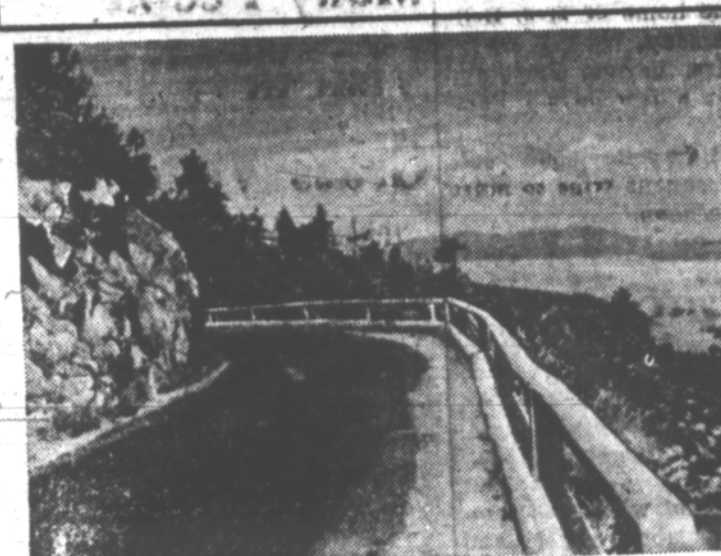
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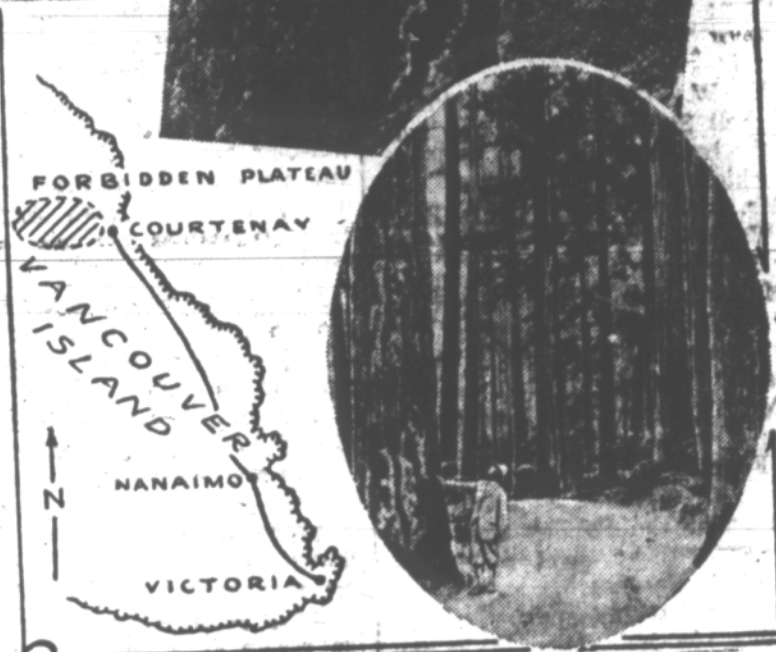
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Safety Deposit Boxes for Lease

THE FORBIDDEN PLATEAU IS NO LONGER TABOO



ONCE an area which was taboo to the Indians and around which they wove weird legends, The Forbidden Plateau on Vancouver Island, British Columbia, is today one of the most spectacular scenic spots on the Pacific Coast. It lies at an elevation of 4,000 feet just west of the Island Highway near Courtenay and is easily reached by car. The view from the plateau is one of great mountain peaks and a splendid panorama of Georgia Strait between Vancouver Island and the mainland. The photograph shows: upper left, a portion of the Island Highway between Victoria and the Plateau; upper right, Cruikshank Canyon which presents a vivid idea of the Plateau country and, in oval, a section of some of the tall timber through which parts of the Island Highway runs. Inset is a sketch map showing the location of the Forbidden Plateau and the general route of the motor road from Victoria. In addition to its scenery the Forbidden Plateau also offers some of the best fishing waters on the Pacific Coast.



HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

An excellent main dish for summer days is found in a salad. In preparing a salad there is no last minute cooking to add to an already sweltering kitchen. The ingredients come out of the ice box rather than off the stove. This being true, a salad may be prepared well in advance of the meal and put together at the last minute.

If it is to be a main dish, in addition to fruits or vegetables, the salad may include fish, eggs, cheese or nuts. Both fruits and vegetables are important in the diet for their mineral and vitamin content. Raw vegetables particularly are in favor combined into salads, for they offer food values and flavors that so often are lost in cooking. Cottage cheese is a nourishing and healthful food that combines well with raw vegetables and fruits. Cottage cheese may be used to stuff tomatoes. It may be served often and at the same time offer

variety if chopped olives, onions, or chives are added to the cottage cheese. An excellent salad may be provided by arranging shredded raw vegetables and slices of tomatoes about a central mound of cottage cheese.

Fruits in season offer possibilities for varied salads. In a pitted fresh peach, filled with cream cheese, rolled in coconut and served with whipped cream dressing on a lettuce leaf, we find a fancy salad that is both tasty and nourishing. Cherries too are delightful in salad.

Stuffed Cherry Salad

Remove the pits from stewed and sweetened or canned cherries. Royal Apples are best. Stuff each cherry with a walnut meat. Arrange on a crisp lettuce leaf at the side of a mound of cottage cheese. Grapefruit sections may be added if desired. Serve with French dressing.

Frozen Fruit With Cottage Cheese

One cup cottage cheese
1-8 tsp salt
One cup pineapple finely diced
One and a half cup cherries, stewed or canned and pitted
One cup of peaches, stewed or canned and diced
Two oranges, diced
Eight marshmallows, quartered
One cup whipping cream
One half cup mayonnaise

Mash the cheese with a fork or force it thru a coarse sieve. Combine the cheese, salt, fruit and marshmallows, tossing lightly together with a fork. Chill. Whip the cream until stiff, combine lightly with the mayonnaise. Fold the cheese mixture into the whipped cream, place in the freezing tray of a mechanical refrigerator for several hours, or pack in equal parts of ice and salt for four hours. Serve on crisp lettuce and garnish with additional mayonnaise combined with whipped cream. Serves eight to ten.

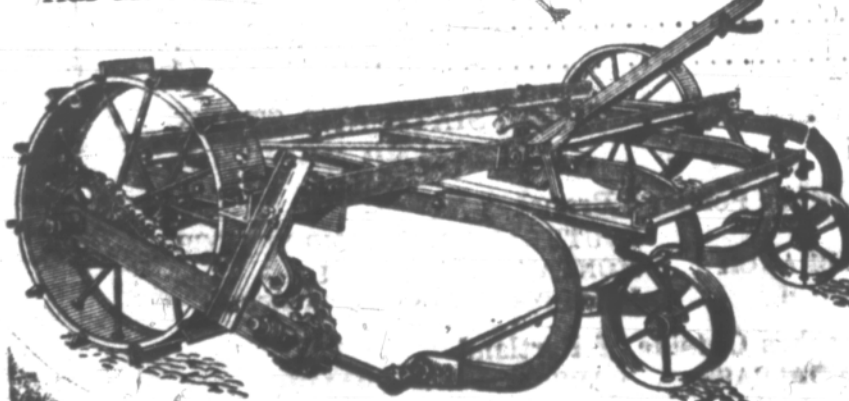
