## 4-H Club Demonstrations For Plummer Trophy Award



Boys and girls from six Western states to show actual results of work done in livestock, crop, home economics fields.

Practical demonstrations of 4-H Club work will be staged on Tuesday, October 5, and Wednesday, October 6, by teams from six Western states during the Pacific International Livestock Exposition to be held in Portland from October 2 to 10, inclusive.

Elimination contests have been held in communities and then in counties to determine qualified state representatives. Competing teams will consist of four members—two boys and two girls from each state.

Boys will demonstrate work done with livestock and crops and girls will present evidence of their endeavors in the field of home economics.

Final award will be based on the average number of points won by both boys and girls of the same team, rather than a total number of points gained.

For the twelfth consecutive year, the winning team in these demonstrations will be awarded the much-coveted Plummer Trophy, a large, silk American flag.

As stated O. M. Plummer, general manager of the Exposition: "We feel that by conducting competitive demonstrations of actual work accomplished, we are afford-

ing these boys and girls a great opportunity for gaining practical knowledge and experience. Results in past years have been very gratifying. Numerous times we have been pleasantly surprised by proof of genuinely original research accomplished by these young men and young women of the West's 4-H Clubs."

The Exposition will pay 50 percent of transportation and other expenses of members of teams to participate in the Plummer Trophy Demonstration contest, up to the following amounts per state: Montana, \$100; Utah, \$150; Nevada, \$100; Idaho, \$75; Washington, \$50, and Oregon, \$25. The allocation is determined by the distance the teams must travel to the Exposition.

These amounts are to be based upon four members composing the two teams from each state. In case of less teams or members, the funds will be pro-rated on a basis of four. Additional money will be supplied by community and other interested organizations.

From advance information received the management of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition is looking forward to an even greater attendance than last year.
