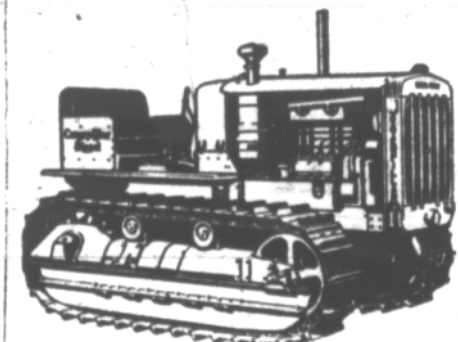

HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

The cottage cheese grandmother used to make on the back of the kitchen range . . . what the old country folk called smears or or schmeir kase . . . was mighty good eating. Even in those days, however, cottage cheese was likely to be a temperamental product.

Most of the cottage cheese found on the market today is the mild flavored "popcorn" type . . . that is, the big flake, low acid kind made with rennet. The size of the flake varies according to local demand. In some sections its an inch flake; in others a quarter inch. The larger flake, the more whey is retained in the center, the less readily heat penetrates it . . . and the sooner it should be used, as it sours more quickly. (Any type of cottage cheese is a highly perishable product, however, and should be stored in the coolest possible place and eaten soon.)

High quality cottage cheese has a clean, mildly acid flavor, a smooth uniform texture, a tender curd. If a cheese is tasteless or over-acid or bitter, or has a hard or tough curd,

CLUTCH SLIPPAGE

Motorists who carry trailers should see that the clutch in the car is kept properly adjusted at all times, according to Z. H. Lano, manager of the Emergency Road Service of the Oregon State Motor association. Unless the clutch is correctly adjusted the extra strain caused by the trailer load will cause slippage, increased generation of heat and rapid wear of clutch facings.

One fourth tsp salt
Juice of one lemon
Grated rind of one lemon
One half teaspoon vanilla
One pound of cottage cheese
One fourth cup flour
Met the butter in bottom of 2x12 pan. Cool and spread over the top two-thirds of zwieback combined

with powdered sugar. Beat eggs, add granulated sugar, salt, lemon juice and rind, vanilla and cream. Stir in cheese, then flour. Put thru sieve and beat well. Pour in pan with remaining crumbs on top. Bake 250 deg. for one hour. Turn off heat and leave in oven one hour longer.

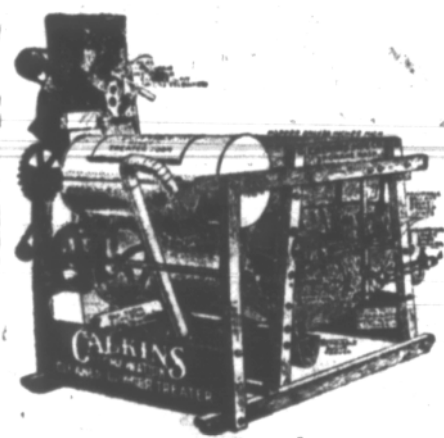
there is ample space remaining for the breadwinner's paradise, and a recreation room if he so wills.
