Try Roasting a Rib This Way



IF YOU have tried the modern method of roasting meats in a constant temperature of 350 degrees Fahrenheit to achieve tenderness and avoid shrinkage, then add another trick to your list! Use the broiler rack and pan in the oven of your up-to-date gas range and place the meat on it fat side up as pictured.

This permits the circulating heat to surround the meat evenly, and the dripping fat drains into the receiving tray—about one-half cupful

from a five to six pound standing rib roast. Once placed in the preheated oven, the meat needs no further attention until the roasting period is ended, for the oven heat-control manages everything properly.

Should your modern gas range have a special type of broiler such as a circular rack fitting into a chrome-plated pan, the pan itself may be placed under an oven rack on which the roast reposes. Or you may put the meat in a shallow roasting pan—but never, never use a cover!

Conservation Meetings Held

A series of district meetings designed to give county association leaders and county agents a thorough understanding of the 1938 agricultural conservation program so that they in turn may pass this information on to the farmers of the state has been arranged for the last two weeks in October, announced F. L. Ballard, vice director of the Oregon extension service, which is in charge of educational work in connection with the program.

Each of these meetings will be of two days duration. State officials who will attend each meeting to lead the discussion of the program are N. E. Dodd, Haines, chairman of the state committee; F. M. B. and, head of the division of animal industries at Oregon State college, and N. C. Donaldson, secretary of the state committee.

As soon as this series of meetings is completed, a series of 1-day meetings will be scheduled in each county in Oregon for all county and community committeemen with those who attended the first series acting as instructors. Those will be held during the first two weeks in November. Actual dates have not been set, but will be announced soon.

The third step in this educational campaign in connection with 1938 program will be the holding of a meeting in each community in which farmers planning to take part in the program will participate and elect committeemen for the year. These will probably come the last week in November, according to present plans.

Sherman county leaders will meet in a district conference at Arlington October 27 and 28.

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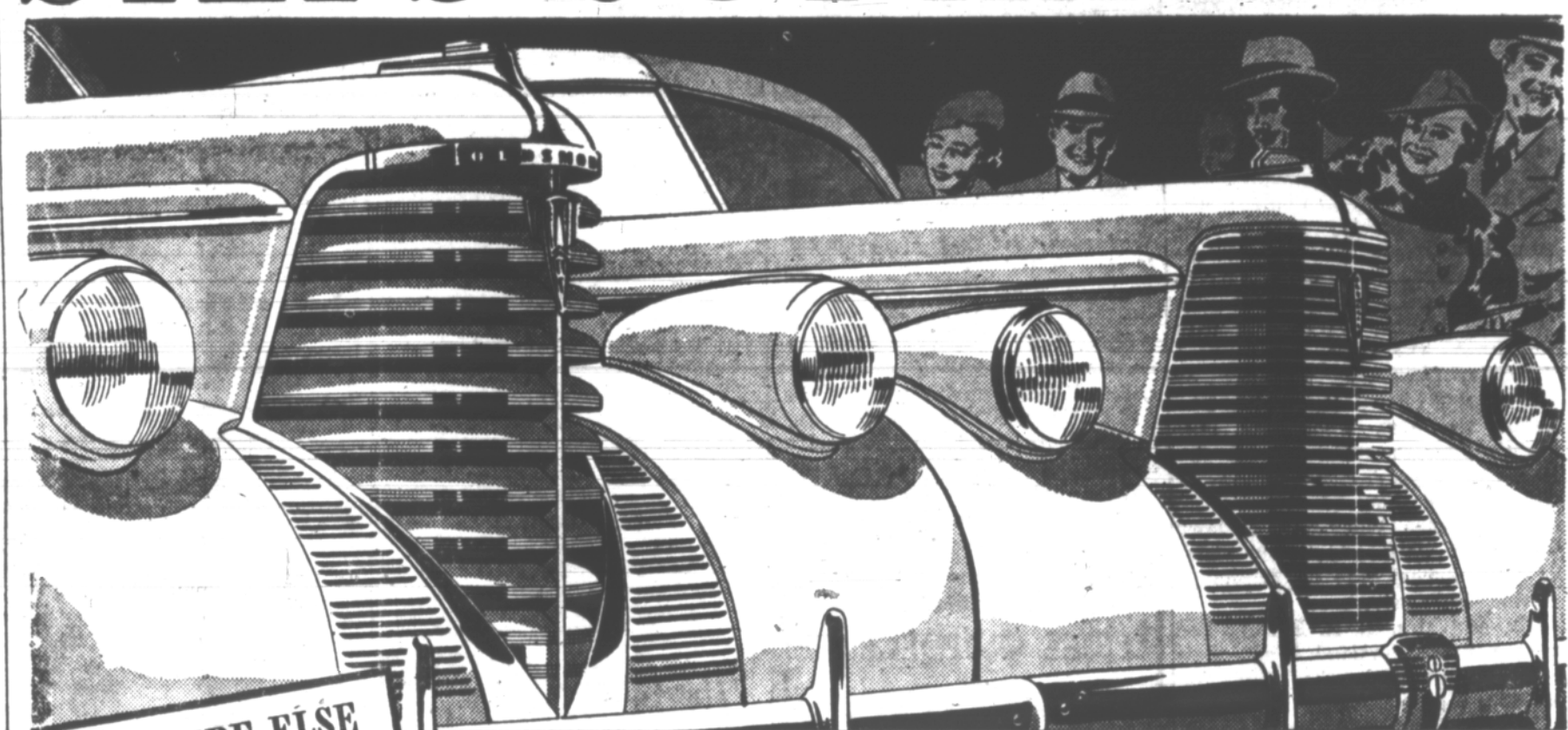
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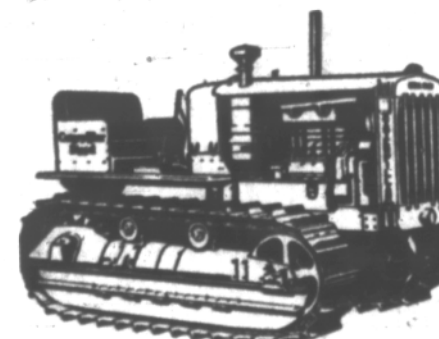
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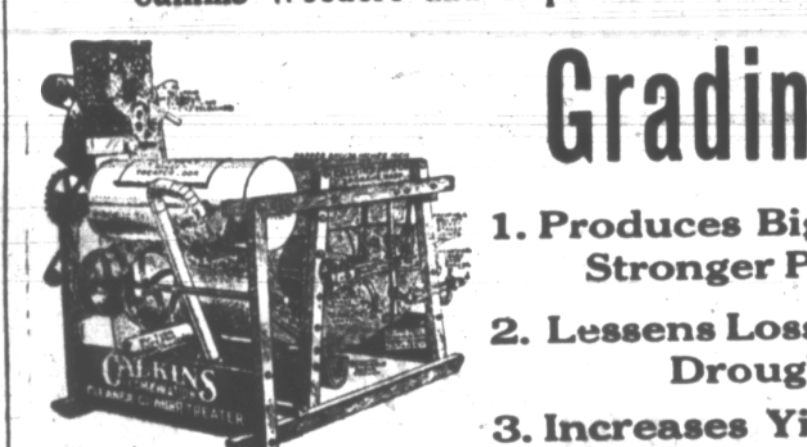
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
