"What suggestions and recipes can we give Mrs. Homemaker this year that will be of the greatest possible help to her in planning and preparing her Thanksgiving day?"

Of course, the home maker knows that there is no turkey substitute. She is presented each year with many fine turkey, dressing and trimming recipes so that in the questionnaire one of three important phases was a request for something in addition to turkey... a meat dish, both festive and a surprise supreme.

Home makers are interested, too, in suggestions for breakfast and the supper "snack." And lastly they ask "How can I arrange my Thanksgiving dinner so that each member of the family will be more grateful for the table laden with an abundance of food?" This question is representative of the fine group interested in preserving the spirit of Thanksgiving.

In serving an inexpensive substitute for turkey, yet one that delights. Cranberry Leg of Lamb roasted and stuffed, served rather lavishly garnished with Minted Pears and Browned Mashed Potato Rosettes is certain to please. In the oven at the same time, a Casserole of White Onions, can

bake nonchalantly in a creamy cheese sauce. A second green vegetable can be prepared, and will add color contrast.

To complete this dinner, a gelatine salad could be prepared the previous day. It offers the easiest salad answer; but again, with Cranberry Sauce, and a hearty dish of olives and crisp celery, it is really unnecessary. When the turkey has been forfeited, all can easily be forgiven when the meal is finished with a spiced mince or pumpkin pie, and the edible portions of a harvest table centerpiece, the nuts, dried grapes, kumquats, and beaming apples.

There need be no apologies for this dinner, and you'll find the family very grateful for the table when so laden with simple, thoughtful abundance. A brief history of Thanksgiving given before announcement of the dinner will further help to preserve a spirit of Thanksgiving.

Cranberry Leg of Lamb and Dressing

Order a leg of lamb boned before delivery and ask that the bones be sent with the lamb. Reserve the bones for broth. Wipe the meat clean and fill with: Two cups stale bread crumbs

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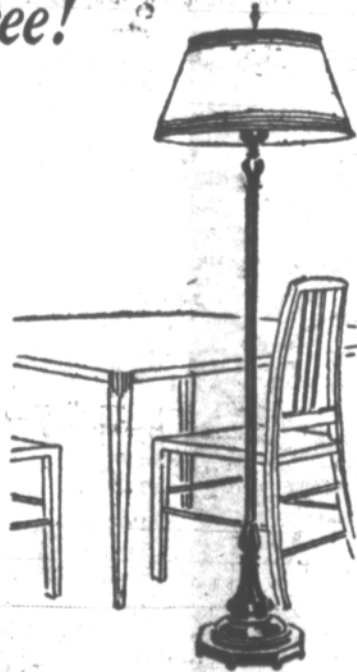
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Kent Notes
