BEWARE OF CARBON MONOXIDE GAS

A seasonal warning against carbon monoxide, the unseen killer of the highways, was issued this week by Secretary of State Earl Snell.

"Crisp weather means motorists will be tempted to warm up their cars in their garages before starting out, and will also be tempted to drive on the highways with the windows closed and the heaters going," Snell said.

"Both of these practices are highly dangerous. The motor should be warmed up out in the driveway, if a warm-up is necessary, and in no event should the motor be started until the garage doors have been opened.

"At least one window should always be rolled down a couple of inches while one is driving, to provide for constant circulation of air. If all the windows are left closed carbon monoxide may filter through the floorboards in sufficient quantity to make the driver drowsy and unable to control the car. Many deaths have occurred in this way. Remember to shut the motor

off if you are applying chains or working around the rear of the car. An Oregon driver lost his life last winter because he breathed carbon monoxide fumes while trying to provide traction for his rear wheels in a mudhole.

"November is also a good month to have your muffler and exhaust gaskets checked for leaks. This simple precaution may save your life."

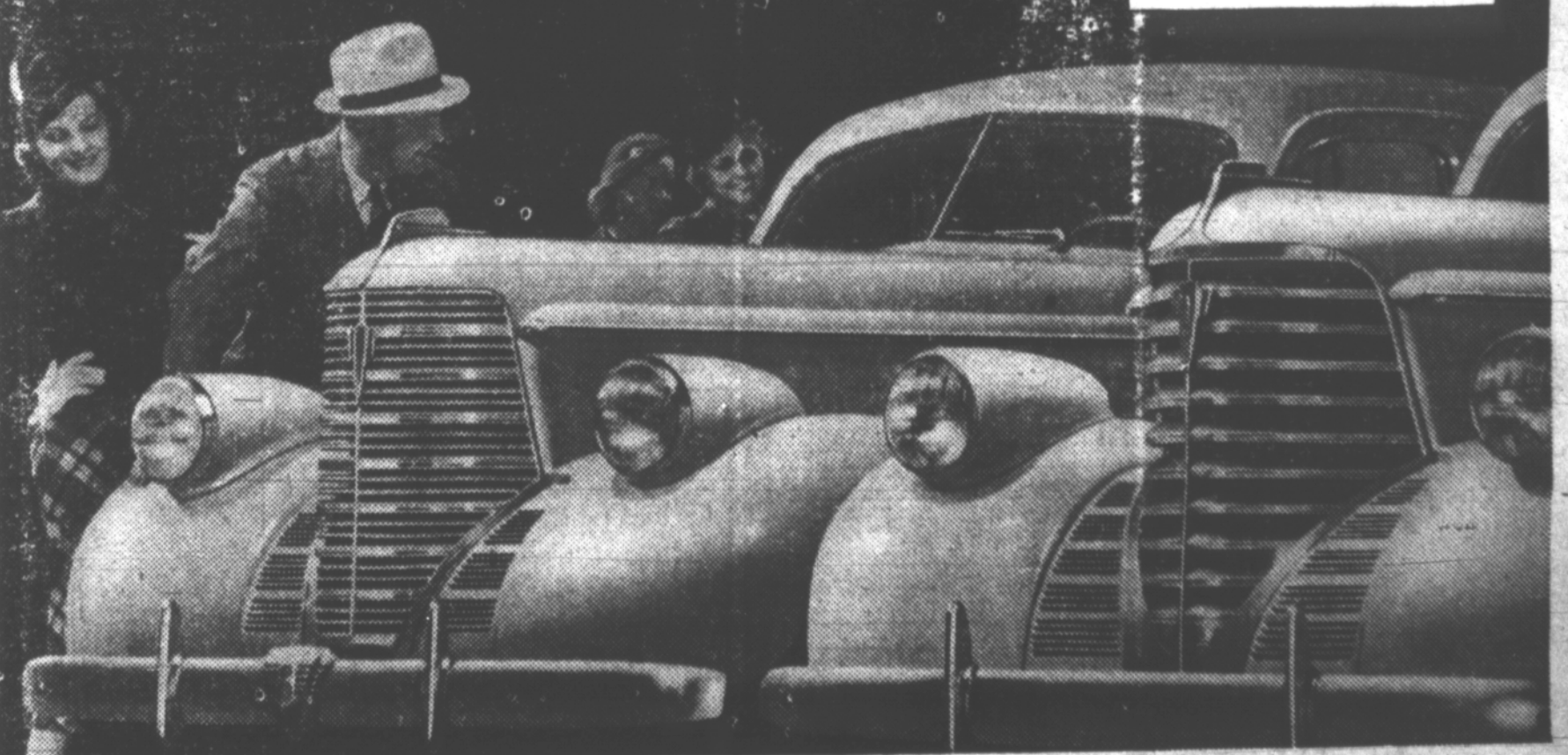
