BREAD AND HOLIDAY COFFEE CAKES

It is better not to let our minds dwell on our country's achievement in bread if we want to be proper patriots; but we can allow it to dwell to advantage on the excellent qualities of German bread.

Nothing is more tantalizing than the aromas which escape from the bakeries of the Fatherland.

Pumpernickel and rye breads, steadily becoming more appreciated in this country, owe their origin entirely to the German people. (An interesting legend is recalled by an old pumpernickel vender in a Washington market, who was born nearly a century ago. She believes that pumpernickel is the healthiest bread in the world.

"The recipe for making pumpernickel," she tells you, "was discovered entirely by chance. During a great war, the soldiers were unable to get any wheat for bread. On the march, the army came to a vast field of rye still unharvested. The officer in charge commanded the rye from the farmer who owned it, and because the soldiers were very hungry, the grain was harvested immediately and drawn to the camp in a cart by an old horse named Nickel. The soldiers ground the rye on flat stones between two wells or "pumps" and in memory of the place and the old horse who brought them the grain, the flour was called "pumpernickel."

Just as Germans excel in bread making so have their cakes been proclaimed the most tempting in the world. Cakes are not always excessively sweet and fine in texture. Some of the finest, and those most welcome during the holiday season are those of sweetened raised bread. In various shapes they bear the name of Kaffee kuchen. This cake is a toothsome delicacy, it balances the

many concentrated sweets that are about everywhere at Yuletide, and it is easy to make.

Kaffee Kuchen

Three fourths cup milk
One fourth cup butter
One fourth cup sugar
Three fourths teaspoon salt
One half cup raisins
One fourth cup each currants and citron
One yeast cake
One egg
One eighth teaspoon cinnamon and crushed cardamom
Two and a half to three cups flour
Scald milk, add butter, sugar and

salt. When lukewarm add yeast cake, broken in small bits and stir until dissolved. Combine all with enough flour to make a soft sponge, beating well. Allow to rise until double in size, then add additional raisins, currants and citron, egg, flavoring and sufficient flour to make a soft dough, but not stiff to be able to knead. Beat well and allow again to raise. Turn out on floured board, and roll to half an inch thickness into rectangular square. Spread surface generously with additional amounts of melted butter, chopped nuts, cinnamon and sugar. Roll as for jelly roll, and place on buttered baking sheet with two ends meeting to make a circle. Then with scissors make cuts toward the center, allowing space of one inch. Twist each little cut, so that it lies on its side. Allow to rise until double its bulk, then bake in moderate oven 350 - 400 degrees, about 20 minutes. Cover with simple icing, and decorate further with cherries and angelica if desired.
