Overgrazing has become a problem which is attracting more and more attention throughout the range country of the West. The Soil Conservation Service has noted a number of earmarks of overgrazing which stockmen can easily recognize.

The condition of the stock coming off the range does not necessarily indicate the condition of the range. But when there is a predominance of such annual weeds and grasses as cheat and needle-grass-lupine types, they indicate that the range is severely overgrazed.

Another indicator of overgrazed range is the predominance of plants which have little or no value for any kind of livestock. Where these plants are abundant they indicate that the range needs careful management to give the better forage plants a chance to come back.

Grazing a range is like harvesting a crop. The best long-time yield from a range will come from regulated grazing which will allow enough seed to ripen during the grazing season to insure renewal of the more valuable forage plants.

Turning stock onto the range too early in the spring has resulted in much damage because if early grazing is repeated year after year the vegetation is robbed of its nourishment, vitality of the forage plants is lowered and weakened plants fail to produce fertile seed.
