FARM MACHINERY SHORT

COURSE PLANNED AT OSC

A three weeks tractor and farm power equipment short course to be held January 10 to 29 has been arranged by the agricultural engineering department at Oregon State college. Special emphasis will be given this year to operation and care of diesel tractors.

The course is open to practical farmers or adult students of any age, though a tuition charge of \$40 will be made to cover extra expense necessary in handling such a course. Application blanks have been sent to all county agents, or

may be obtained direct from the college.
