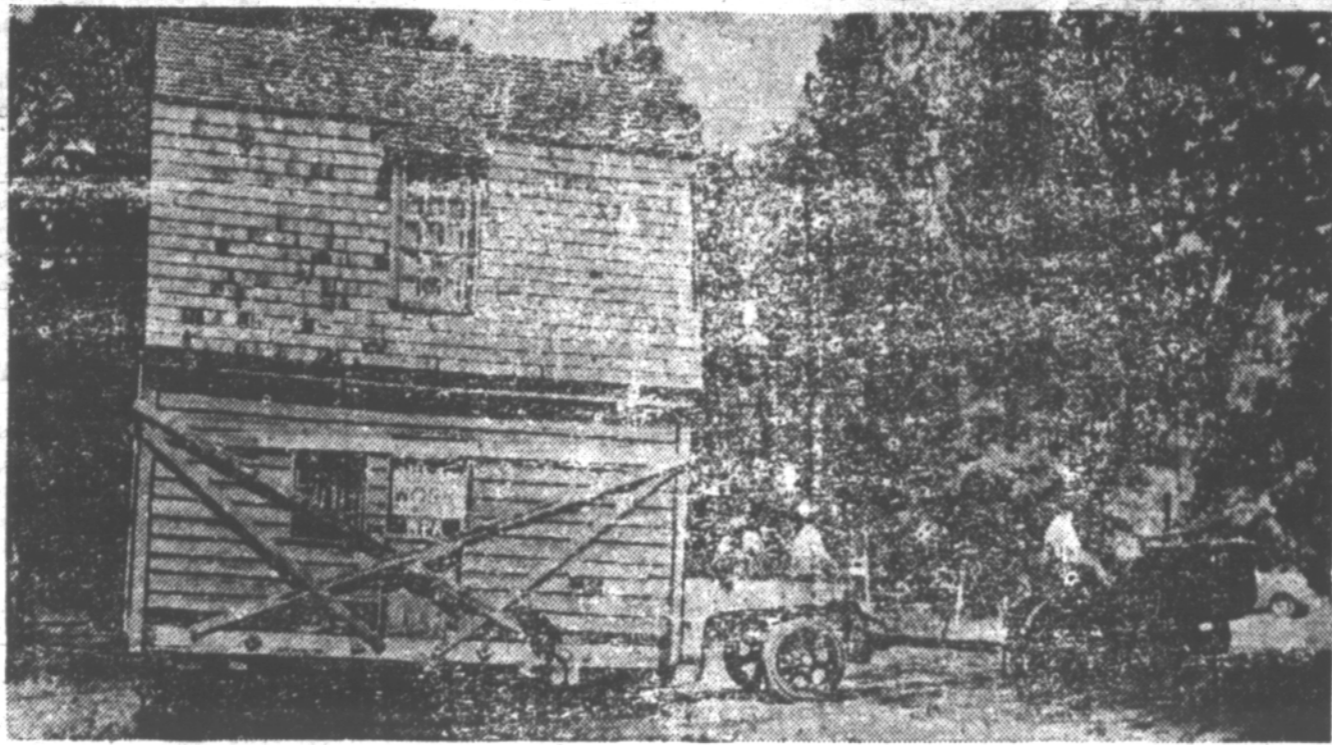

Farmers Oppose 70 Car Train Bill

If the so-called 70-car train bill and other legislation affecting the wages and hours of the already generously paid railroad workers of the country are passed by the forthcoming session of congress freight rates will become so high that agriculture cannot possibly hope to survive, in the opinion of J. B. Adams, president of the Oregon Producers and Shippers Association.

Adams called attention to the fact that only recently the heads of many of the important agricultural associations of the state appealed to farmers of the west to organize immediately and fight the legislation now pending before congress.

"Measures already passed by Congress during the past few years together with rising labor and material costs, have increased the operating expenses of railroads by nearly \$700,000,000 a year," he said. "As a result of these rising costs, the railroads have petitioned the Interstate Commerce Commission for increases of approximately 15 percent in their rates."

"We realize that railroads must have increased revenue if they are to survive, and yet at the same time we realize that agriculture must be given protection. Frankly, agriculture is wondering just what is going to happen."

"We are wondering whether or not we are headed toward government ownership of our railroad systems. We are wondering what protection, if any, will be given to agriculture. It is a serious situation and one which agriculture must meet and solve before it is too late."

State Game Commission Gives Notice

The Oregon State Game Commission will hold its annual hearing regarding angling regulations on Friday, February 11, 1938, in its offices in 616 Oregon Building, Portland, Oregon at 10:00 o'clock, a. m.

At this time the 1938 angling seasons and bag limits will be determined, and sportsmen and others interested are requested to submit their recommendations in regard to the following:

1. Is present trout season satisfactory?
2. Is present trout bag limit satisfactory?
3. Is the closing of any waters recommended?
4. Is the opening of any waters now closed recommended?

Recommendations in writing should be forwarded to the office of the Game Commission not later than Saturday, February 5, in order that they can be compiled and submitted in advance to the Commission for consideration. It is assumed that any organization not furnishing recommendations will be satisfied with such regulations as are made by the commission.

All regulations made at this meeting will be embodied in the 1938 angling synopsis and changes thereabout will not be considered by the Commission except in case of emergency.

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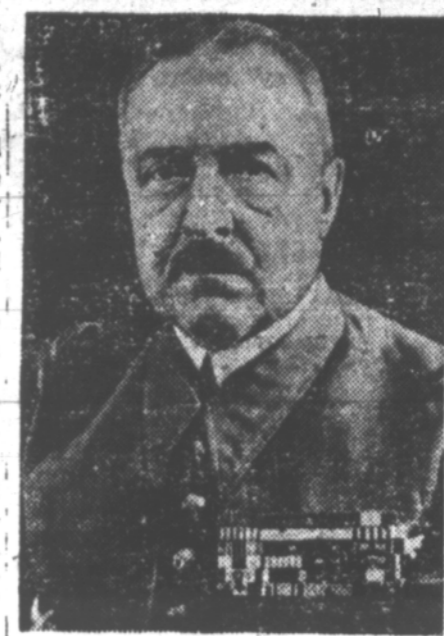
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GOVERNS PARIS

Newspapers of Oregon entered in the annual Sigma Delta Chi contest, will receive the expert criticism of Bruce R. McCoy, manager of the Louisiana Press Association

and a national authority in this field, it was announced by William H. Lamme, Astoria, chairman of the competition.

A record number of entries are expected to compete for the Sigma Delta Chi cup, to be awarded for the best weekly newspaper, and for the Hal E. Hoos memorial cup for the best paper in cities under 1,000 population. Awards will be made at the annual winter newspaper conference, to be held on the University of Oregon campus January 20, 21 and 22.

Judging will be made on the basis of news and content, editorial page, front page, mechanical make-up, and advertising.

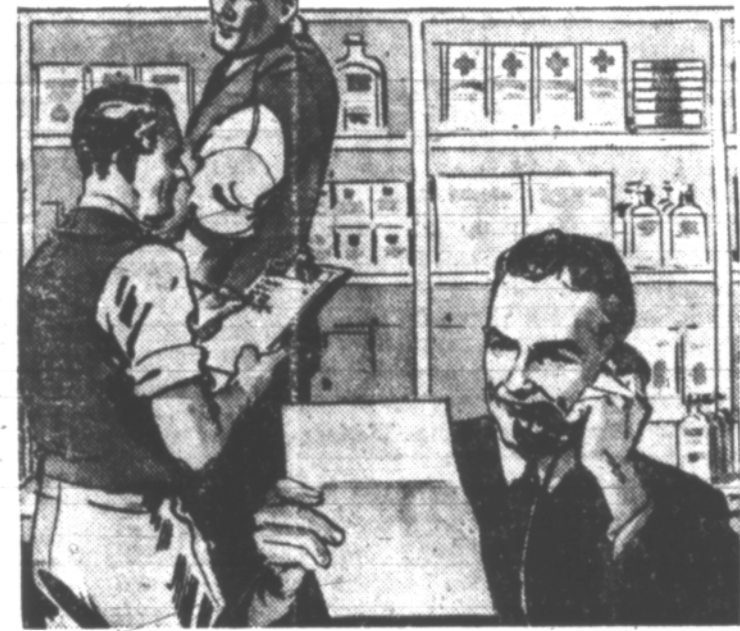
The contest, which has always aroused wide interest, has been conducted for several years by members of the University of Oregon chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, national journalism fraternity.

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
