HI-WAYS TO HEALTH

MID-AFTERNOON REPAST

School children, radiating tingling red cheeks and bright eyes from crisp outdoors, have a habit of immediately dashing for the kitchen when they return home from school. They are hungry, of course and want something to eat.

The conscientious mother might well be confused about her problem of what to serve at this afternoon time if she gives consideration to all that she has read and heard. She has perhaps read the "three regular meal" rule. She may have read that in-between meal eating spoils appetites and is the forerunner of digestive trouble. Heaven knows how many snatches of advice on the subject of "In-between Meal Eating" have been gallantly given by her neighbors.

But really, this afternoon snack is no problem. First of all, no given law will apply to all children. Factors that make a difference are age, sex, activity, the type of lunch eaten, and the type of dinner to be anticipated.

True, a few simple rules must be kept in mind. Large amounts of candy should be frowned upon because it may disturb digestion, and assuredly it will affect the dinner appetite. Neither are large amounts of food desirable, for the reason that this afternoon repast is to be a tie over for dinner, and not a dinner substitute.

Fruits, when attractively displayed in a bowl, will catch the child's eye. An apple, orange or banana will often satisfy the hungry child, and is an excellent way to get extra fruit in the diet. Ice cream, because of its high nutritional value, should be considered often. It is sure to please, too. And sometimes a milk drink, made by the addition of either chocolate sirup or fruit juices, wait waiting in the refrigerator, with a full cookie jar, will be the answer.

Occasionally, and perhaps as often as once a week, a coveted treat consists of tall glasses of cold milk and thick slices of ginger bread. Gingerbread is easily prepared, is not too sweet, and it has an overwhelming popular appeal. It can be baked in gems or in a bake sheet. It may be topped with shredded coconut or nuts, before baking, or with whipped cream when served.

This Southern variety has reasons for representation with Milk for that afternoon siesta.

Southern Gingerbread
 One half cup butter
 One half cup sugar
 Two eggs
 One cup light molasses
 Two and half cups flour
 One tsp cinnamon
 One half teaspoon cloves
 Two teaspoons ginger
 One teaspoon salt
 One and a half teaspoon soda
 One cup hot water

Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs well beaten and stir in molasses. Sift flour with spices, salt and soda. Slowly stir into mixture. Beat until smooth, adding hot water gradually. Bake in a buttered sheet pan at 325 deg. for 25 min.
