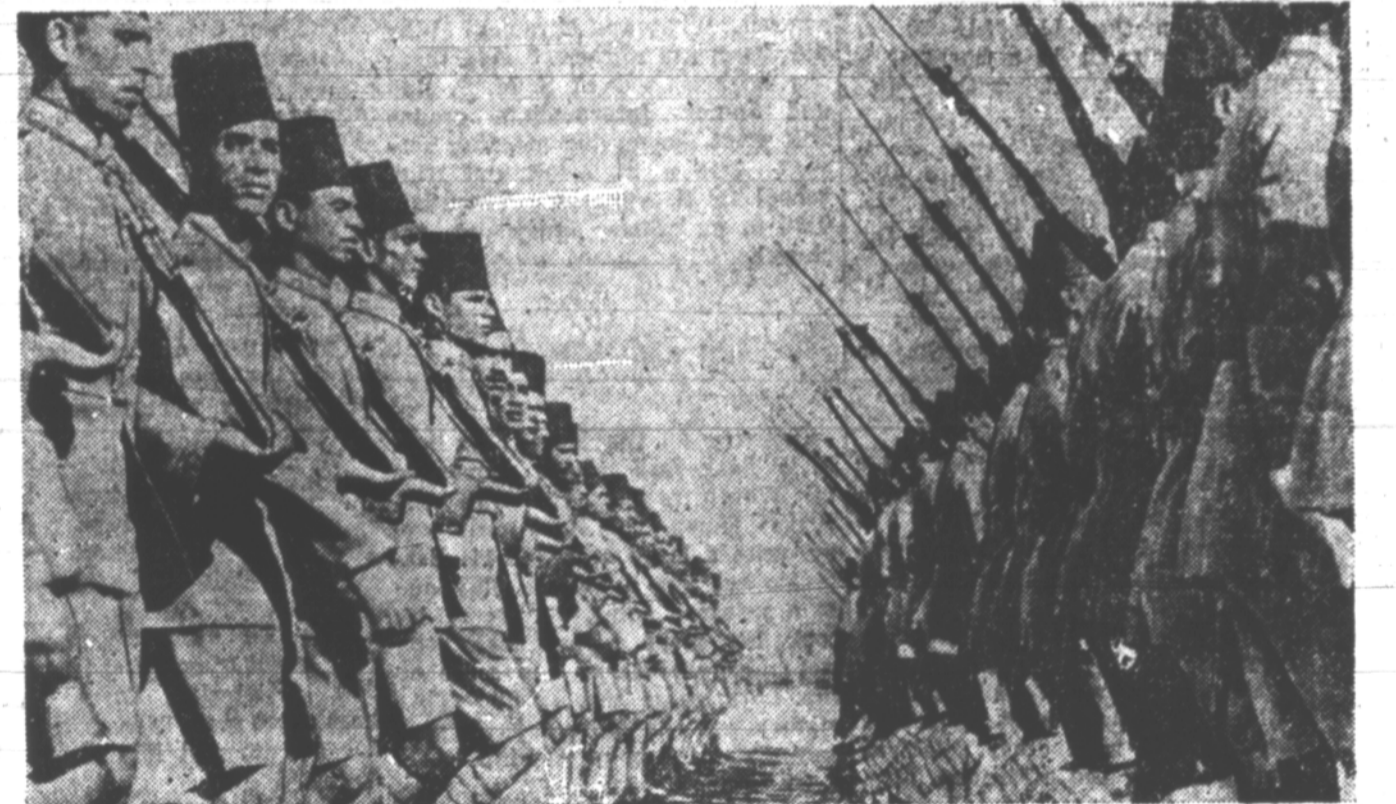
They're All-America Flowers for 1938

Winners of high awards in the All-America selections of prize flowers for 1938 are: left, Orange Fantasy Crested Calendula, which received award of merit; center, Golden West Marigold, which received special mention, and extreme right, Navajo Zinnias, which also received special mention. The Navajo Zinnias are a unique type, with flowers of medium size, double and semi-double and composed of long, narrow petals some of which are fringed. Each petal is heavily tipped with white, or creamy yellow.



Salmon Petunia, shown at left, was a special winner of the highest award in the All-America selections for 1938. Selected from a wide variety of other flowers entered in the competitions, the petunia was regarded by the judges as the finest of its type they had ever seen. Garden experts who assisted in making the selections pointed out that petunias are increasing in popularity among amateur and professional gardeners.
