Wheat Leads In Oregon Crop Acreage

Wheat, with a total of 835,052 acres in cultivation, leads all other crops in acreage in Oregon, while small grains, including oats, barley and rye as well as the staple wheat, total 1,207,416, or considerably more than a third of the cultivated lands in the state, a report, "A Survey of the Demand for Agricultural Labor in Oregon," shows. The report was completed recently by the Oregon state planning board.

Oats, with a total acreage of 271,741, barley with a total of 71,954, and rye with 28,678 are included in the small grains total. Second to wheat in acreage is grain hay, which shows a total of 388,533 acres. Oats comes third. Alfalfa hay is fourth with 242,224 acres, assorted tame hay total 221,534, vetch 98,330, wild hay

98,005, barley 71,945, and clover hay 63,324 acres.

Hops, practically all of which are grown in the Willamette valley, are found on 17,774 acres. In furits prunes are away ahead in acreage, with 47,197. Other fruits cited are apples 22,858, pears 17,271, cherries 8,292, peaches 2,901, strawberries, 10,633, raspberries 4,415, blackberries 1,189, and loganberries 1,920. The state has 14,425 acres in walnuts and 5,230 acres in filberts.

Board staff members, as a WIPA project, surveyed 2,714,847 acres, or 96 per cent of the total of 2,831,742 in cultivation in the state. The amount of labor needed in agriculture was carefully computed and the information, which is expected to be of great value, put in table form. H. H. White, associate economist, prepared the report under the direction of V. B. Stanbery, planning board consultant.

HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

Had you read in browsing among historical food facts, of the scandalous edict that was passed in the city of Bourges, France, in the Lenten season of 1622.

This edict prohibited the use of cheese, and it left the good citizens at first speechless, and then very indignant. Politicians appeared at fault in their attempt to restrain the importation of cheese. However, the offense was so great that the citizens of Bourges, like the remainder of the Lent observing world, realized the place of one of the principal foodstuffs in these early days of prayer and fast before Easter.

Historically, cheese is one of the oldest of manufactured foods. It is not the only food that can substitute for the abstinence of meat throughout Lenten season. Fish, eggs, dried peas, nuts and beans likewise act as muscle and tissue building foods. All, however, depend for their palatability on milk, butter and cheese when used as a dinner entree. For this reason the list of cheese dishes that can transform any fast into a feast day is virtually endless. That "something" with cheese so easily and "protectively" becomes a daily congenial Lenten consideration.

Cheese Omelet
Three tablespoons butter
One and a half tablespoons flour
One half cup milk
Three fourths teaspoon salt

One fourth teaspoon paprika
One fourth teaspoon dry mustard
One half pound American cheese
grated

Two cups cooked rice
Three eggs
Make a sauce with butter, flour, milk and seasonings. When thickened and smooth remove from fire and add grated cheese. Stir frequently until cheese is melted. Add rice and beaten egg yolks; mix well.

Fold in beaten egg whites. Pour into a shallow buttered baking dish; bake in a moderate oven until firm in center, about 50 minutes.

Salmon Timbales
One pound can of salmon
One cup soft bread crumbs
One fourth cup milk
Three tablespoons butter
One tablespoon chopped onions
Two eggs beaten
Salt, pepper
One half pound American cheese
One third cup milk

Remove bones from salmon and flake with a fork. Combine with crumbs. Add milk, melted butter, onions, eggs and seasoning. Pour into buttered custard cups and bake in a moderate oven 30 minutes until firm.

Slowly melt the cheese in top of a double boiler. Add the milk gradually, stirring constantly until sauce is smooth and creamy. Unmold the timbales and serve them with the hot cheese sauce. Serves 6.

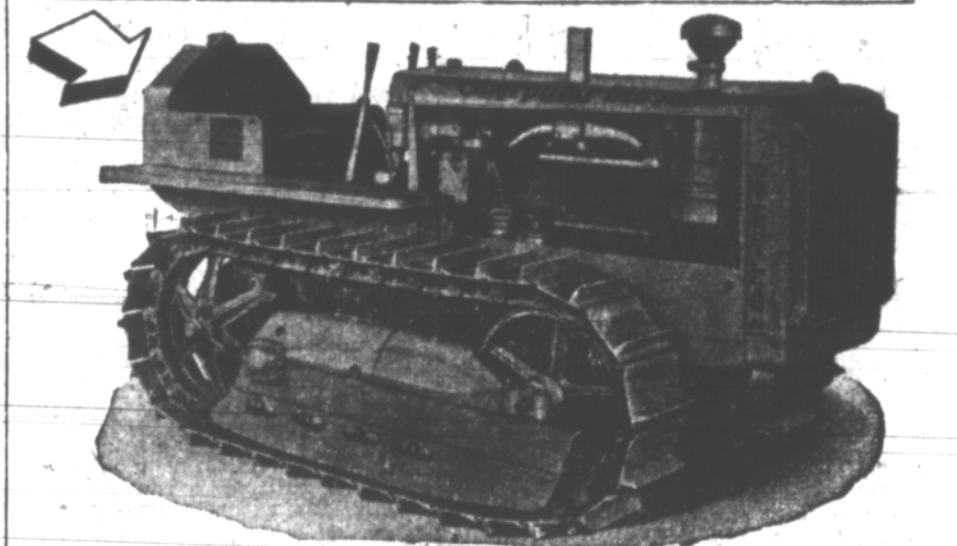
