EROSION CAMPS

(Continued from page one) soil to create a porous, wash-proof and blow-proof surface, has been adopted on more than five thousand acres of wheat land with erosion control areas in central Oregon.

Several hundred thousand trees and shrubs have been planted on Oregon farms under cooperative agreement with the Soil Conservation Service. Plantings have been

in the form of shelter belts, woodlots, for wildlife food and shelter, and to hold soil on gully banks and steep slopes.

Rangeland improvement work has included the development of 115 springs to increase available stock water supplies, and the construction of 38 miles of range fence. In emergencies these camps are called upon to fight forest, brush, and grass fires.

Aside from conserving the soil these CCC boys have benefited through healthful outdoor work, good food, educational programs, and training in American citizenship.
