### TRACTOR MOVING

In case you wish to move a tractor over a public highway, you should seek permission from the state highway commission, or from the county court in the case of a county road. Farmers whose lands adjoin a public road may move their tractors along or across the road in case of necessity, but they make themselves liable for any damage which may be done to the road.

### Accidents Come To Poor Drivers

Drivers who were involved in fatal accidents in Oregon last year had noticeable worse driving records than run-of-the-mill operators, Secretary of State Earl Snell said today on the basis of a thorough study of the drivers records.

Three hundred ninety four motorists were involved in fatal traffic mishaps in this state in 1937. About three fourths of this total possessed current Oregon operators' licenses, and no record was available on the remaining one fourth of the drivers, who were not named in reports or who held out-of-state licenses.

The group whose records were available averaged nearly one accident per driver within the past six years, including the fatal accident.

On the other hand, the average motorist has been charged with less than half an accident during the same period. Snell's figures show. That is, the driver involved in fatal accidents produced just about twice as many mishaps per driver as did the general run of motorists.

This tendency is particularly noticeable among the high accident drivers, Snell said. More than 10 per cent of those involved in fatal accidents had three or more mishaps charged against them in the past six years, while less than three per cent of the average drivers reached this total.

"While these figures do not indicate a general tendency, they also remind us that the average is not immune from fatal mishaps," Snell commented. "As a matter of fact, about three fifths of all the death-car drivers last year had never reported a previous accident."
