THE CAMPAIGN

The statement in this paper by
the Salem correspondent that
the major interest in the primary
campaign is in the gubernatorial
contest between Governor Martin
and his two adversaries seems
correct from observations made in
this section of the state. It has
accounted for no small part of
the change in registration to
Democratic in the past few weeks.
Upon the decision in this race
probably rests the vote for the
governor this fall.

Many Democrats who will support
Martin in May would not be
opponents this fall in case the
governor should not win. Conversely
many will support Hess or
Olsen who would not vote for Martin
this fall. This fact makes it
very difficult to foretell who
may be governor next term.

Charles Sprague is expected to
win the Republican nomination as
he is the only candidate for that
party who has made any trip
around the state and is probably
better known than any of the
others. Some of the eight are men
with excellent reputations in
their localities. Sprague would
be an excellent choice who would
be a credit to the state as governor.
With him and Martin on the
November ticket the state would
be assured of a good governor for
the next four years.

The race for United States
senator has not attracted much
notice on either side. Carl Donaghy
who is credited with a good record
as federal attorney for Oregon,
will receive the votes of the conservative
minded Democrats who
largely distrust Willis Mahoney,
the promising ex-mayor of Klamath
Falls. Holman is expected to
win over Robert Stanfield. He has
many friends who point to his fine
record as state treasurer and as
officer holding in Multnomah county.

ROAD MONEY

There has been a movement to
change the method of distribution
of highway fund moneys that are
returned to the counties along with
the current movement to obtain
more of these funds for counties
and for cities now as well. At
present the distribution is made
on a per capita basis.

The grange, or at least some
granges, have been active in an
effort to have the distribution
made on a basis of mileage. A
compilation of the data the highway
commission has gathered
about use of the roads and highways
might be of some use in determining
how the money should
be apportioned also. While none
of these methods would be entirely
satisfactory all of them have
advantages that may be taken into
consideration in establishing a
new basis, if one is determined to
be advisable.

The population basis, while
perhaps the fairest of any exclusive
method, does give the counties
in which there are large cities
a big advantage over the more
rural counties where agricultural
production is most important. The
mileage basis is manifestly unfair
to the populous areas although
the addition of city streets
to the total of roads would reduce
this unfairness and perhaps defeat
the purpose of the proposed
change. The use basis could not
be used alone, either, for highways
are used in some relation to their
condition and roads now bearing
little traffic would be more used
if improved.

The committee is now waiting
for a report from the state-highway
engineer about the roads and
the distribution of road moneys
to the counties and it is probable
that some bill to devise a different
method will be introduced at the
next session of the legislature.

Before being passed it should
be considered by the people so that
the new law, if any, would meet
with the public approval.

The examiner of operators and

chauffeurs, will be in Moro on

LITTLE MEN WHAT NOW.

One Hitler, an Austrian who has
been doing very well in Germany,
is in Rome to call on Mussolini,
a former sergeant in the Italian
army who has achieved higher
distinction since war days. Reports
are that they make some progress
in settling the future and fate
of the people of Italy and
Germany and Austria. It may, and
it may not.

Boys herding the cattle on Alpine
slopes may be shot over the
out come of the conference and
school girls of Germany may die
an ignoble death if one of the
self styled great men become
irritable over the parley. The two
swaggering gentlemen are in a
position to take themselves very
seriously—and do.

This meeting should point out
to the rest of the world that dictators
are dangerous although
having some advantages as to
speed of action. If Herr Hitler's
digestion is unsatisfactory on Italian
food—or if Mussolini partakes
too heartily of the banquet man
may die and those who produce
the food of central Europe may
be taken from their lands.

Nations that give heed to dictators
are gamblers, risking all
on the wisdom of one man, who in
spite of what he makes the public
think about him, is still merely
another human who may be as
wrong as a house painter or a
blacksmith. And after all, is it a
desirable ruler who even wants to
have the job of being responsible
—solely—for millions of people
who want to live and breathe and
enjoy life?

THIRD PARTY

The possibility of a new political
party engineered by the LaFollettes
of Wisconsin is not particularly
exciting to a people that has
seen new parties born nearly every
four years and has seen one election
kill them dead than a Jew's
chances of being a German officer.

It seems very probable that the
method of a third party will not
be successful in changing the
alignment of parties. We do need
a chance for now conservatives
and radicals cannot vote their preferences
within the bounds of their
parties in a general election. Perhaps
we have too much loyalty to
party and too little to ideals of
government and that if voters
could shake off party preference
they could better express their
ideals toward government.

Certainly there are many Democrats
who do not follow the new
deal and its spending program and
other ideas. Yet as long as that
faction of the party is in control
they must go along. It is true
that there are many Roosevelt
Republicans who follow the lead
of the president and believe, at least
in part, in the new deal.

Were the control of appointments
made entirely dependent on
an adequate civil service, wholly
removed from party control the
machines that too often rule elections
would be impossible. Then
voters might express their opinions
on principles of government
or on men without party loyalty.

This is the opposite of the long
time theory that party government
is necessary to this country. It
depends on a division of voters
according to principles of government
instead of on prejudice toward
parties. It is a common
sight to see men voting for a party
in whose ideals they find no belief
because their fathers voted that
way. Such a plan would require
much more studying on the
part of the electorate and that
would be desirable in itself. It is
doubtful if a third party will
materially aid in bringing it about,
however.

Secretary Wallace blamed politics
for criticism of the new farm
bill. Correct Henry, the politics
that passed it before it was adequately
discussed, the politics that
caused it to be changed after the
farmers had given partial approval
last summer, the politics that
refused to accept amendments
passed by both houses, the politics
that refuses to acknowledge
the time-proven laws of economics
and boasts of crop reduction
in the face of the largest acreage
the nation has known. That is
the kind of politics that is causing
criticism of the farm bill
and it will continue until the law
is made workable.

Perhaps if the much advertised
postage stamp rate is popular
when the government gets better
control of the railroads freight
rates will be put on the same basis
and a Montana wheat grower will
be given the same price for his
wheat as a Sherman county
grower.

budget there will be no organized
opposition to the program so far
as Oregon is concerned. High state
officials, those whose paychecks
will be hardest hit by the federal
tax, are practically unanimous in
endorsement of the proposal. Governor
Holman, Secretary of State Snell,
members of the supreme court and
heads of various state departments
who have been interviewed on the
subject admit the justice of the
proposal that state employees
should bear their share of the cost
of government. While there are
a total of 9825 men and women
on the state payroll drawing an
aggregate of \$11,045,000 a year a
large majority of these will be
exempt from the federal tax. Statistics
compiled by the budget
department show that the average
annual wage for men on the state
payroll is only \$1620. Most of
these men are married and entitled
to an exemption of \$2500. While
women in the employ of the state
earn an average of \$1152 a year
many earn less than \$1000 a year
which is allowed to single persons
before the income tax applies.

Oregon farmers are urged by
the State Department of Agriculture
to insist that the seed which they
buy for spring planting is properly
labeled in accordance with the
provisions of the new Oregon seed
law. The new law is designed
to protect farmers from purchasing
seed containing noxious
weeds, according to Frank
McKennon of the department.

Although officials of the re-employment
service appear before
the Board of Control six weeks
ago with a demand for immediate
approval of a lease on a new office
space in Portland to save them
from being thrown out into the
street the deal is still pending. At
that time the re-employment service
was urging rental of a building
at \$850 a month. Negotiations
conducted by the Board of Control
reduced the rental to \$700. New
conditions written into the lease
by the bureau resulted in a stalemate.
The Board of Control this
week reiterated its willingness to
approve the lease on the \$700
basis but so far the bureau and the
building owner have been unable
to get together on an agreement.

Peoples utility districts will be
in position to issue revenue bonds
or certificates without specific
consent of the voters if a measure
being sponsored by the State
Grange wins approval in the November
election.

The population at the state prison
continues to show a steady
growth, Warden Lewis reported to
the Board of Control this week.
The prison population shows an
increase of more than 65 since the
first of the year and is now approaching
the previous peak of
1108.

Eight convicted labor vandals
now occupy cells in the Oregon
penitentiary. Al N. Banks, Salem
teamster union leader, is the latest
addition to the prison "gron"
colony. A number of minor offenders
caught in the recent raids
on labor racketeers are serving
short terms in county jails.

More than 50 per cent of Oregon's
relief cases are centered in
Multnomah county according to a
report of the State Relief Committee
to Governor Martin. Lincoln
county has the highest per
centage of relief cases with 76 out
of every 1000 inhabitants on the
relief rolls. Jefferson has the
smallest per centage of relievers
with only nine out of every 1000
persons receiving public assistance.
