### First Wool Loan Made In Oregon

The first official appraisal for the Commodity Credit Corporation loan on wool was made at the Pacific Wool Growers' warehouse in Portland on May 21, when Grover R. Barney, Commodity Credit Corporation appraiser for the Pacific coast, began work on clips delivered to the Pacific cooperative by its members. The Pacific Wool Growers was recently approved to make the commodity loans to its members. The official regulation provides that any producer who is a member of a cooperative marketing association may negotiate loans through such an association, and that association's meeting the requirements of the Capper-Volstead Act may arrange to secure funds from the corporation to make advances to members. "Members of a cooperative such as the Pacific," says Manager R. A. Ward, "do not have to execute the individual commodity credit corporation producers' note or other documents required of individual growers, yet their loans are fully guaranteed. The Association also advances freight, grading, storage and other charges for its members and takes of other details in connection with the making of the loan and the handling of the wool."
