MILK BOARD AGAIN

The district representative of the Oregon Milk Control Board dropped into town last week and preemptorily ordered local milk producers to raise their price, or else. This in conformation with some rule or other made by the board without consulting either local dairymen or local consumers.

The theory on which the milk board was established was that it was to protect the dairyman from going broke through producing milk that could not be sold. There may be a use for it in some parts of the state, and evidence is that there is such a use around Portland. There is no possible use for the milk control board here and it certainly is not a proper function of a government board to raise the price of milk—or any other commodity—when the producers and the consumers are both satisfied with the price.

If it is impossible for the milk control board to restrict its activities to places where it is needed—as determined by hearings and investigations—there should be a change in the law to zone the state to keep it out of places where it is neither needed or wanted.

COUNTY FAIR RACING

If a spectator might presume to make a suggestion it would be advisable for the fair association, at this early date, to set forth the rules for horse racing at the fair this September. Definite understanding of entrants, rules of the races, definition of saddle horses and time of entry would clarify many arguments at fair time.

It would save time and worry on the part of the officials and would make the fair a bit more enjoyable from the standpoint of the spectator who is, after all, the one to be considered.

WHEAT

The wheat must look good all over the world to judge from the price. But even discounting local pride, it is hard to believe that anywhere it look better than in Sherman county. To the farmer who looks over the waving fields and sees overproduction and low prices the fine appearance may not be so pleasing.

But as a work of art. If nature had tried deliberately—and perhaps she has—no prettier sight could be made than to cover these rolling hills with a mantle of green two or three feet thick of waving grain. It could not be more painted on to look smoother.

It has been some years since the wheat was as beautiful as it is this year, for in other years there have been spots where the seed did not germinate or drought cut down the growth or weeds gained the upper hand. This year—so far—the fields look perfect, as if nature and the farmer had both worked together as one to bring out all that was in the land.

There are those who say that the wheat farmers of the world would be better off if conditions were less favorable, if there was prospect for failure instead of for plenty. And they may be right. However there is so much balm to the spirit in knowing that the returns were good, that the crop was well sown on well tilled ground that is perhaps worth some surplus.

EMOTION AND REASON

A recent book about Hitler and his leadership in Germany states that he is master of influencing mass emotions but is not gifted with reasoning powers of consequence. It is probably true and to a lesser degree is true of all dictators. They cannot expect to rule by reason for the very fact that one man desires to rule a nation is unreasonable.

To a certain extent the same thing is true in this country. Mr. Roosevelt's most outstanding characteristic is his ability to appeal emotionally to the voters. The slogans and catch words with which he has achieved political success have been emotional. Talk of the forgotten man, and the well put phrase about the third of our population being ill fed, ill clothed, and ill housed has more appeal to the emotions than the reason.

It has long been accepted as a known fact in this country and in all others, since history began to be recorded, that some people didn't have as much of worldly goods as others. The poor always go have with you." A restatement of the fact adds nothing to the public's information but does give an emotional kick.

The truth of the matter is that even the poor nowadays are richer than mighty Caesar, who never rode in an automobile, heard a radio, had his mail delivered, saw a newspaper or ate a canned vegetable. They are poor compared to the wealthy, not compared to the poor of another time.

Reiteration of inequal economic conditions is valueless unless some thing is done—something reasonable is done—to change them.

Oregon courts are still trying indicted labor racketeers and one or two are put away nearly every week. Terms vary from a few months in the county jail to several years in the penitentiary. This is all indicative that the goons are not gone yet. Citizens will be wise if they remember the spring house cleaning of the governor and state police for many years to come. No outbreaks of violence are to be expected this year for that would be very damaging to the candidates who are running for office with labor support. There may even be a scarcity of strikes and jurisdictional wars. They may be held over until there is not so much at stake.

Attorney General Van Winkle this week ruled that this could not be done by the commission since the funds were appropriated for specific purposes.

Oregon's new \$2,500,000 capital building, now nearing completion will be ready for occupancy by July 1 but formal dedication of the building will probably be postponed until next January when the legislature is in session, it was decided by the capitol commission here this week. Carpets are now being laid in the legislative chambers and finishing touches being rushed on the interior of the building. Rugs, drapes and furniture for the House and Senate and the executive suite will not be ready for several months. The contractor expects to be off the job by the middle of this month and the work of moving into the new building will get underway as soon thereafter as the janitors can make the building habitable.

Work on the new \$17,000 administration building at the state fair grounds is well under way and the first unit will be ready for occupancy before this year's fair opens on Labor Day. This unit, in addition to the administrative offices will also provide quarters for the press, telephone and telegraph offices, a first aid station and a radio broadcasting booth.

MILK FOR LITTLE DAVE

When the State Unemployment Compensation Commission's check No. 250,000 arrived at 1325 Sixth Street, West Salem, Daddy Perry J. Lee bundled baby David Leroy, 21 months; Perry Arlym, 4; and Dorla Jean, 6, off to the grocery store. Their smiles and filled market basket are typical results of the program which has distributed \$3,000,000 to unemployed Oregon workers eligible for jobless insurance since January 2, Lee, a sheet metal worker by trade has been unemployed since Christmas. This was his fourth \$15 benefit check. The Lees left North Dakota five years ago, driven out by the drought. Unable to obtain work at his trade, the 29-year-old ex-Dakotan is taking over a hosiery agency in the West Salem district. "In the meantime, I'm certainly glad Oregon has an unemployment compensation law and that the contributions paid by my employer on last year's wages entitled me to this compensation," said Lee as he cashed his check.

Astoria, Tillamook, St. Helena, Milwaukie, Newberg and Gresham will move to the camp by motor convoy, requiring 107 trucks, 24 station wagons and three ambulances. Five troop trains consisting of 23 tourist sleepers, 24 coaches and 18 baggage cars will be required to carry the more distant units.

Camp Clatsop, rated as the finest military training cantonment in the United States, has been greatly improved since the Oregon troops last assembled there in 1936. General White points out. New roads have been built, old roads improved, a new natatorium and recreation building has been completed, additional tent frames and floors installed, bath houses, mess halls and kitchens provided to accommodate the increased strength of the guard and extensive landscaping added materially to the attractiveness of the camp.
