mittees set up under the old NRA procedure. Already in Portland, we learn, retail grocers, building material dealers and other trade groups, are setting up such committees to police the enforcement of the new Oregon law. The Federal Robinson-Patman law is enforced by the Federal Trade Commission, but no such enforcement agency is provided for the Oregon law.

The new Oregon law regulating prices that can be charged for

merchandise or "service trade" in the state, and each business transaction must be eliminated carefully, we are informed by the Oregon Business & Investors Inc. office, which makes a specialty of studying the meaning and effect of such legislation.
