Oregon Furniture In Wide Market

Oregon furniture manufacturers have more nearly supplied local demand during the past ten years, and in addition have successfully invaded Atlantic coast markets, a report of the Oregon State Planning board entitled, "Location of Oregon's Basic Manufacturing Industries," declares. The report, which was prepared by the board's advisory committee on commerce, industry and economics, sees in the increased production of high grade furniture the greatest opportunity for expansion.

Furniture manufactured in Oregon during the year 1935, the latest for which accurate figures are available, was valued at \$6,496,000 gave employment to approximately 2,000 wage earners, and accounted for 3.18 percent of the total value in the state added by manufacture, the report states.

How Much Space Needed To Pass On Highway

The answer to this question depends not only upon how fast your car and the other car are going, but also upon the difference in the speed of the two cars. Assuming you are travelling 40 miles an hour and the car you are passing is travelling only 30 miles an hour, and assuming also that the nearest approaching car is travelling 40 miles an hour, you will need about two city blocks, or 600 feet, to pass with reasonable safety. If the relative speeds are stepped up over, the passing distance is nearly tripled—that is, you will require about a third of a mile to pass safely.
