### Loans To Eligible Farmers This Year

Wheat growers whose total acreage of soil depleting crops for 1938 does not exceed 105 per cent of their soil depleting acreage allotment will be eligible for loans under the ever-normal granary plan, according to information just received from Washington by the state AAA office at Oregon State college.

While details regarding the amount, terms and conditions of the proposed loans have not been fully developed, it has been definitely announced that loans will be available this year because of the low farm price on June 15 and the

To qualify for loans, the wheat must be stored either in federally licensed or approved warehouses, or in eligible storage on farms in certain states. Oregon is included among the states where farm storage will be permitted. A leaflet explaining the requirements which farm storage must meet is now being prepared.
