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SOME "YES-BUT" FELLOWS
 As president of the United States I will have nothing to do with the primary elections, but as leader of the Democratic party I feel that I have every right to speak.
 As a doctor I advise you to stop drinking all forms of alcohol, but as your host, Have another cocktail.
 As father of this family I will show no favoritism between my children but Jimmy if you don't give Bobby that ball I'll take your plate off the table.
 As mayor of this town I have nothing to say about how public employees vote, but as a citizen if my friends are not re-elected there will be some changes in the appointed personnel.
 As a friend you are the soul of honesty and flower of chivalry, but as a banker I wouldn't loan you a dime.
 As governor I have nothing to say about who the people elect but they had better think as I do, or else—

POSITION OF WHEAT
 During the first ten years after the world war there was a price for wheat caused in no small part by the fact that this nation or its citizens were loaning money to Europe with which to buy. We had a great foreign trade—with our own money.
 For various reasons, including our own tariff policy, and the ultimate realization that the debts could never be paid that trade was lost. Since then there has been a lower price for wheat. We now have little but the domestic market which would not absorb wheat grown in the twenties and certainly will not absorb the additional bushels of wheat grown under crop reduction programs of the thirties.
 Drouths and poor crops made it appear for a time that the crop reduction methods were successful. Now we find ourselves with wheat on 80,000,000 acres instead of the 66,000,000 acres that were in wheat when crop reduction began and we still have crop reduction programs although the original one was declared unconstitutional.
 It is apparent it will be impossible to make wheat acreage reduction successful by paying a premium for raising it, by assuring the grower of payments or a price for his crop. Growers of other crops with no such assurance immediately turn to wheat and wheat growers, themselves, put their idle acres in other crops. This puts the entire agriculture of the nation out of joint with wheat land producing grass and cotton land raising wheat.
 The contention of those who held that we should raise less wheat than in the twenties was correct. The methods taken to reduce the crop were not correct. If the desire of the government is to provide a balanced agriculture it cannot be done by changing crops on lands where the most advantageous crop is already known. This county and district will not be aided by being forced to change to some thing other than wheat, for instance.
 If—as now ordered—we cut the wheat acreage to 55,000,000 next year and the cut is made on every farmer now raising wheat, this county will be forty per cent out of the wheat business. The farmers who have been growing wheat for less than five years should take the cut instead of those who have land that has grown wheat for fifty years.
 The legitimate wheat grower is in a bad position. He is faced with a cut in acreage so severe as to impair his income seriously, he has no foreign market, and it is doubtful if enough money can be appropriated to give him much of a price for what he can grow because the cut will be so great. Piling up wheat through the

medium of federal loans to wheat growers threatens to bring about the same surplus conditions of the old farm board which was another economic theory that did not work.
 In all it seems as if the wheat growers problems have not become less in recent years. Furthermore, it is doubtful if they do become less until there is a decided move away from wheat on the part of farmers who can raise some other crop.

WHEAT
 There is this about the looks of the wheat crop this year: it makes the most difficult to impress observer comment on its beauty and prospect.
 No one who is sensitive to beauty and who knows the marks of healthy wheat crops can drive past many winter wheat fields without some exclamation of delight with it. There is so much richness in the yellow stalks, so much promise in the heads now maturing, fat kernels that brings joy to the producers.
 And this joy is now alloyed with consideration for material profit—that comes from another source. The true farmer enjoys raising a good crop for his own sake. He wants each planted seed to germinate and grow, be watered and sunned by nature, take advantage of tillage done for it and come to maturity without damage from pest or insect. Then, regardless of price, the primary job has been well done; the farmer has multiplied his seed; brought bountiful produce as his contribution to the general need.
 And it is that way this year. Farmers have a good crop, with nature's aid. And, if the economists, the politicians, the tradesmen, the dealers, could do as well none would cry for bread this winter, no hungry pinched children would be seen in school rooms and no men would have robbery and murder in their hearts because their stomachs were empty.

Statehouse Gossip

Gasoline sales in Oregon during May, totalling 20,582,615 gallons, were the second highest for the month in the state's history, according to Secretary of State Earl Snell. The figure was one per cent below the record set last year. During the first four months of the year motorists paid more than \$4,000,000 in taxes, with \$1,029,130.77 being collected in May.

Governor Martin this week asked the people of Oregon to cooperate with the National Safety Council Silver Jubilee program in keeping Fourth of July accidents as a minimum. "I particularly urge all citizens not to mar the holiday by death or injury due to careless driving, unwise use of fireworks, and careless hiking or swimming," the governor said.

State Forester Ferguson believes Oregon forestry and protection has progressed 20 years since the inauguration of CCC camps five years ago. He said the enrollees spent 135,000 man days in fighting fires last year. There are now 2400 CCC youths in Oregon.

Only seven of the 86 cases appealed from the Oregon state supreme court to the United States supreme court in a period of 86 years have been reversed, Arthur S. Benson, clerk of the Oregon court announced this week. The other 79 cases were either affirmed or thrown out.

State Budget Director Wharton this week mailed instructions and forms for the 1938-40 biennial budget to all state department and institution heads. He requested that all budget estimates be in his office by September 1.

The state supreme court announced that the hearing on the insanity proceedings filed against Earl H. Fehl, former Jackson county judge, has been set for July 7. Fehl, who served four years in the state penitentiary for ball thefts, is now a patient at the Oregon state hospital here.

A speed limit of 45 miles per hour after dark will be enforced in New Jersey this year. The lists of states enforcing special night speed limits is growing rapidly, according to Secretary of State Earl Snell.
