New Crop Estimate Near 3,000,000 Bu.

The basis on which payment will be made this year for this county is 110,505 acres according to the county agent. The soil depleting base after compliance has been figured out is 244,966 acres. This means that there is about 134,461 acres of wheat in the county this year which meets preliminary estimates that the crop this year is as large in acreage as the normal crop before allotments were started. With a crop of nearly 135,000 acres and an average yield of twenty to twenty-five bushels it is likely that the total crop will be about 3,000,000 bushels this year, a higher figure than has been thought probable.
