A grass fire caused some damage to the house owned by Mrs. Sarah Stalcup Tuesday but the fire was put out before the house was entirely destroyed.

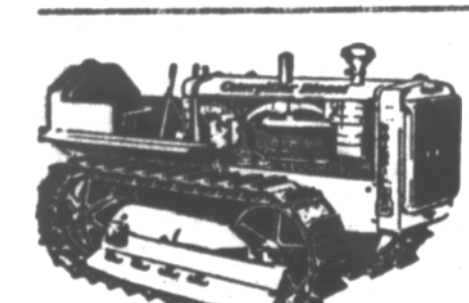
Mr. and Mrs. Bud Howell of Seaside are visitors of Mr. and Mrs. Everett McQuillen at the Wasco Cafe.

FACTS FOR DRIVERS By EARL SNELL Secretary of State

Highway accidents in which more than one person was killed have greatly decreased in Oregon during the first six months of 1938, Secretary of State Earl Snell declared this week. From January 1 to June 30, 1937 there were 13 such accidents in this state, taking thirty five lives. During the same period this year there have been but three multiple-death accidents, taking eight lives. This spectacular decline is attributed by Secretary Snell to general observance of lower speeds than formerly, since the multiple-death mishaps almost always involve high speed.

### SUMMER MENUS

Warmer days are demanding the dishes that make them seem much closer to the North Pole than they actually are. They set up dishes that are definite in flavor, definite in texture, and so generally definite that they tempt and coax. These dishes succeed in keeping up appetites, and in staving off all too common summer energy-less fatigue.

With a greater on-rush of warm days it is hoped that the thought of living entirely on cold foods is not too popular. Modern science has learned that it simply isn't the thing to do, and that it is much better to plan menus to include at least one hot dish with each meal. This may be chocolate for breakfast and hot tea for lunch, but it is hot.

Summer soups bid for first place in providing something hot that at the same time possesses nourishing qualities. The creamed varieties with fresh vegetable flavors never leave a too-heavy feeling, and lay a foundation for follow-ups of cool fruit and vegetable salads, combination cheese platters, and occasionally main dish or sweet omelets. This table wants to have cubes of chilled butter, thick slices of crusty French bread, and does well when its centerpiece of assorted fruits can become the dessert. Better though, is a concoction from the ice box of milk sherbet or fruity ice cream.

Almost any number of combinations can be made, the possibilities are endless for one who is laden with the ambition of complete summertime creation. Rewards of enthusiasm at eating time are very worthy of the effort, and end in real enjoyment of warm days.

Choc-o-spice Shake Four cups of milk Four eggs One half cup of malt cocoa Nutmeg One fourth cup of heavy cream Chill milk. Beat egg yolk. Add milk. Beat in or shake with malt cocoa. Add nutmeg to taste Whip

cream. Pour milk shake into tall glasses. Top with spoonfuls of cream. Dust with nutmeg or grated unsweetened chocolate.

Cheese Soup One quart of milk One small onion, sliced thin Pinch of ground mace One slice of green pepper, one-fourth inch thick Three tablespoons of butter Two tablespoons flour One cup grated American cheese. One teaspoon salt Dash of pepper. Heat first four ingredients over hot water for 15 minutes; strain. Melt butter, add flour and add one cup of the milk. When well blended, add rest of the milk, three fourth cup of the cheese and the seasonings. Serve in

cream soup dishes with rest of cheese and small croutons sprinkled on top. Yield: 6 servings.
