### Buildings Depend On Money

The state's building program for 1939-40 will depend largely upon the availability of revenues, according to Budget Director Wallace Wharton who explains that institution heads are already beginning to formulate their requests for improvements. Among those tentatively outlined are a new receiving hospital and nurses home for the western Oregon state hospital at Pendleton; enlargement of the receiving hospital at Salem state hospital; a new cell block and new dining room for the state penitentiary, and a children's pavilion for the eastern Oregon tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles.

### Education By Mail Popular In Oregon

A "student body" of more than 1,000 is now reported for the state system of higher education's "institution without a campus," the correspondence study division, it was announced by Miss Mozelle Hair, in charge of this work. The "campus" now not only includes the entire state of Oregon, but 23 other states, Alaska and Canada, Miss Hair states. More than 200 courses are now open to these students, many of whom are using them to supplement regular college or university work. Others take the courses for cultural value, or to aid them in a practical way.
