Haste Advised By PWA

With September 30 set as the deadline for filing applications for PWA grants and loans, it is imperative for communities to act promptly in presenting their construction needs to the Public Works Administration, Director Hockley stated.

The PWA regional office already has received more than 250 applications for construction projects in this region, which includes Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Alaska, but is waiting word from approximately 750 application forms sent to public bodies in the various localities, the regional director said.

"With more projects being sought by the country as a whole than it seems likely can receive allotments, and a specific mandate from Congress that no application can be received after September 30, it is obvious that communities in the Northwest which are slow to act may lose out," Director Hockley added. "If inert communities in this region wish to participate in the PWA construction program, they must act now."

A FRUITY VEGETABLE
Following a popular tune, if there ever was a vegetable more lusciously juicy, more appealing to the eye and more to the palate than the tomato, show her to me. For years and years this fruity vegetable has held its own... but at no more seasonal time than August and September of every year.

Of course, for years it was appraised as a vegetable of little nutritional value—but one that nevertheless was worth cultivating. Within the last fifteen years its high Vitamin C content has been discovered and its position is now one of uniqueness in being the one known vegetable or fruit that retains this vitamin with cooking.

Later summer prices place tomatoes within reach of families of very limited budgets. Canning in preparation for the winter supply never seems excessive. Either in juice or whole, canned tomatoes lend themselves to countless uses that no one can afford to overlook. Likewise in their fresh state, their harmonious combination with cream and cottage cheese and in combination with assorted vegetables for a vegetable bowl is too little used.

Frying, by dipping 1-2 inch sliced tomatoes in beaten egg, then fine bread crumbs and browned in butter is a worthwhile method. Broiling, by placing with meats under direct heat builds an easy garnish. Stuffing, for either hot or cold service... all these uses seem inexhaustible and each one forever refreshing and inviting.

Tomato-Cream Cheese Sandwich Salad
(Serves 4)
Four medium sized tomatoes
Two packages cream cheese or One pint of cottage cheese
One half cucumber, grated
Two teaspoons onion juice
Three teaspoons minced parsley
Lemon juice
Salt, pepper and paprika
One half cup heavy cream, whipped
Three fourths cup (about) salad dressing
