Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Baker left for Gresham Friday, returning Sunday.

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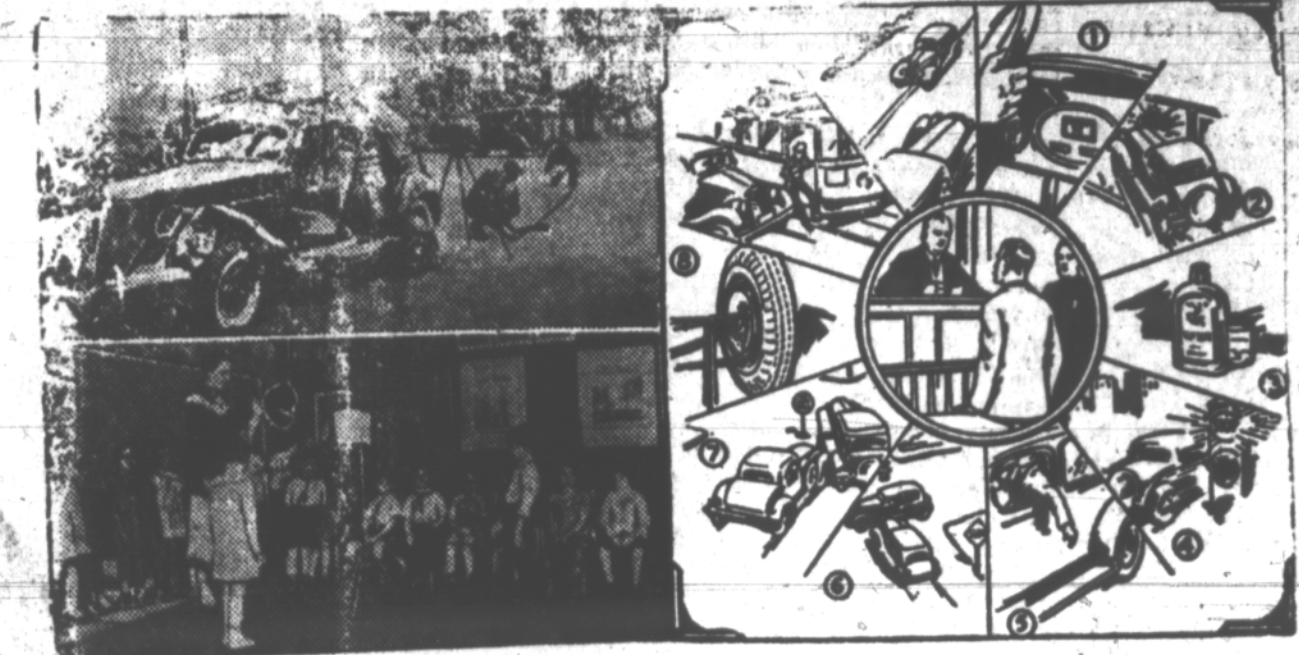
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State Authorities Issue Traffic Control Manual
