Changed Rules Help Crop Loans

With the settlement of procedure tangles between the Reconstruction Finance corporation and Pacific Northwest wheat warehouses, the way is now cleared for Oregon and other northwest farmers to obtain AAA loans on this year's wheat crop whether they have farm storage facilities or not.

This announcement is made by Edgar L. Ludwick, recently appointed state supervisor of wheat loans in Oregon, who reports practically all federally licensed warehouses in Oregon as well as important state licensed facilities on the approved list.

Difficulty arose over the fact that national regulation on storage of wheat covered by loans were not in line with established practices in the northwest. Some adjustment in the requirements as well as in the practices has eliminated what for a while threatened the progress of the loan program in this region.

The procedure in obtaining loans is for the grower to make application through his county AAA committee. In case of public storage of his wheat, the chief step is obtaining clearance on AAA compliance. Where farm storage is being used the wheat must be stored 30 days and the storage facilities must be passed upon by the county committee before the loan can be approved.

Interest in farm storage is heightened by the fact that the government will pay 7 cents a bushel for storage on the farm in case the grain is turned over next spring as settlement of the loan. This would pay a considerable share of the cost of new farm storage, it is pointed out.

State Supervisor Ludwick is maintaining headquarters at the AAA office at Oregon State college. He has had long experience both in grain and wool handling in the northwest. After serving as county agent three years in Idaho he did special grain work for the U. S. D. A., then was assistant manager for the Oregon Grain Growers cooperative, and following that was sales manager for the Colorado Grain Growers. For the past 12 years he was assistant manager for the North Pacific Cooperative Woolgrowers in Portland.

Tax Foreclosure Discovers Oddity

Farm Price Decline Ends

With business conditions and the demand outlook for farm products showing some improvement, the long, sharp decline in the general level of farm prices was reversed during July, says the current monthly review of the agricultural situation by the U.S.C. extension service. The upturn in the general farm price index in Oregon was

from 61 per cent of the 1926-1936 average level to 63 per cent.

Improvement in the farm price situation was rather general, except grains, and occurred despite somewhat better crop yield prospects over the country generally. Compared with April, 1937, however, which marked the farm price peak of recent years, the Oregon index in July 1938 at 63 was down 30 points, and 24 points under July last year.

Sharply lower prices for wheat and the feed grains and materially lower prices for butterfat, wool and lambs account largely for the sharp decline in the Oregon farm price index from April 1937 to June 1938.

With respect to crop prospects, the report says that there will be a general abundance of food crops this year, while the supply of feed grains and hay in prospect is large enough in most parts of the country to provide plenty of food for animal production.

More detailed information is given in the circular relative to potatoes, beans, wheat, feed grains, hay, fruit, and truck crops, and other items.

The report, which also contains the annual mid-summer wheat outlook report of the extension service, is available from county agents or direct from the college. It contains several statistical tables and charts pertaining to the wheat situation and data on farm prices, costs and demand.
