English Labor Laws Give Better Protection

Studies of the British labor laws made by a government committee and by private agencies all indicate that the United States lags in legislation to make labor unions responsible.

The bill that will be on the November ballot will bring some relief from the situation in Oregon if it is passed by the voters. It will prevent union leaders from building up a huge fund to use for purposes unknown to the members and the public and will make it illegal for anyone to interfere with a person seeking employment. This is expected to prevent the numerous beat-ups of recent history.

Minority groups that foment trouble will be prevented in these activities for the bill defines a labor dispute as a controversy between an employer and a majority of his employees. Under this section a few disgruntled or radical leaders cannot start a strike with resultant picketing until they have convinced by peaceful means, a majority of their fellow workers.
