The Pithian Sisters gathered at the lodge hall Thursday evening for their first meeting of the season. A rally meeting will be held for next meeting night.

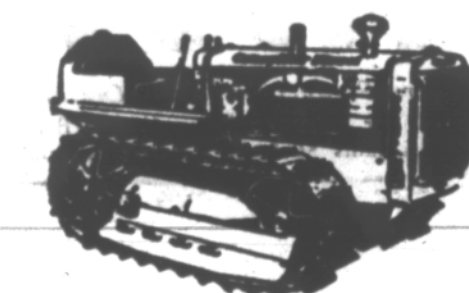
