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Bill Will End Industrial Strife Says Sponsor

"We have had enough industrial warfare in Oregon—more than enough—and the time is here for industrial peace," declares H. L. Shoemaker, President of the Associated Farmers of Oregon, in a statement advocating the enactment of the Oregon farmers' initiative labor bill at the forthcoming general election.

The associated farmers are sponsoring the measure in conjunction with the Oregon Farm Bureau, the Eastern Oregon Wheat League, and the Hood River Growers Club.

"With industry prostrated and labor idle, labor, industry, and the public generally ought to want industrial peace just as much as we farmers of Oregon," continued Mr. Shoemaker.

"In this connection I may add that in this situation, the rights of the public, which has been the greatest sufferer, are paramount."

"Contrary to a false notion more or less prevalent in some quarters, a business enterprise does not exist primarily for the benefit of a particular group in order that it may accumulate wealth, regardless of the consequences that may flow to labor and the public."

Co-operation Needed

"Contrary also to a notion more or less prevalent among labor leaders industrial enterprises do not exist primarily for the benefit of labor in order that it may draw the highest wage scale. The traffic will bear at minimum hours to the injury of industry and the public."

"Both industry and labor exist for the benefit of the general public—their one customer—and the best way for the two to serve the public is for them to adjust their differences peacefully and co-operate in partnership under a single roof. Neither can afford the old 'public be damned' policy."

"Labor, of course, is entitled to a square deal and so is industry. But so is the public which is generally the forgotten party in all industrial and labor clashes."

"It was with the hope of restoring industrial peace that we farmers of Oregon drafted our initiative labor measure."

"It is in this spirit that we are submitting it to the public for approval, and if enacted into law it will give a fair and square deal to labor, industry and the public alike—no more and no less to either one."
