HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

If it's not worry over lunches at the beginning of the school year, it's a double worry on how to sell the petite high school girl or the independent young football enthusiast on the importance and necessity of a good breakfast. Each fall the problem presents itself.

It is only by constantly preparing good breakfasts, having them on time, and then having the "problems" ready to eat without rushing, that eventually the conscientious Mother succeeds in establishing a desirable life time habit.

Why - a breakfast? While it may be one of the lightest meals of the day; it follows a long stretch of resting hours during which there has been no food intake. The very presentation of food to the body for assimilation arouses the attention of the entire digestive system. At the same time, stimulates body functioning and aids in good habits of regular elimination. The body is at a low point of food fatigue in the morning and only with consideration of replacing this need - by eating breakfast - can the efficiency for "doing" be at its best. The fattening qualities of breakfast? They, like the much talked of fattening qualities of our chief protective food, milk, have been exploded for so long as to be trite. A young modern scoffs at the trite, and certainly would not be classed with believing this exploded theory. The regular, light breakfast offsets the keen desire for a ravishingly filling lunch and actually aids in maintaining a better weight balance.

Breakfasts fit the disposition in being light, medium or heavy. Most usually the medium heavy one meets the need of all tastes when guided by this very simple pattern.

Fruit... every morning, and for every one in any form.

Hot Cereal... every morning in cooler weather... cooked in milk,

and good for the school child and active adult.

Toast... most every morning... crisp, well-buttered, and in a variety of breads or toppings of cinnamon, orange or honey.

Eggs and Accompaniments... for every one... at least four times a week, prepared in a variety of methods to eliminate monotony.

Milk... for all below twenty years in age, and for those above, too. May be served sometimes as hot chocolate.

Coffee... for adults.

Eggs in Cream for Breakfast

Six eggs

Two tablespoons butter

Three fourths cup cream

Salt, pepper, paprika

One third cup grated cheese, if desired.

Place butter in frying pan and place over low heat until melted. Add cream and break the eggs one at a time, and slip into the frying pan. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and paprika. Cook slowly until whites are firm. Serve on toast with the sauce in pan.

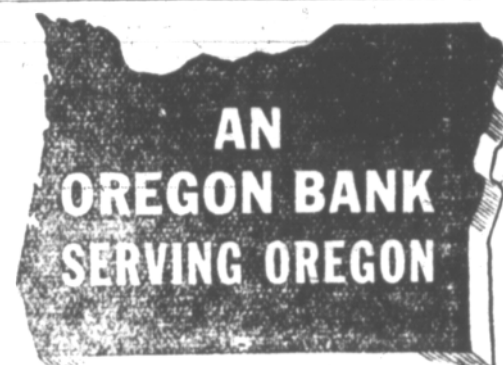

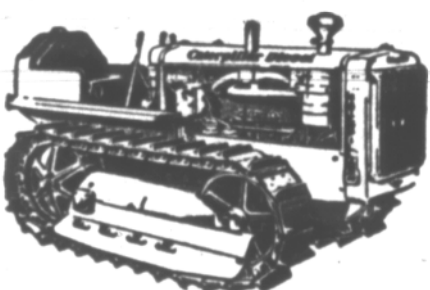
