Baptists Meet
In Grass Valley

The great faith of the persecuted Christians of Russia stirred the hearts of the members of the Deschutes Baptist association meeting in Grass Valley, Thursday, September 22, as they heard the main speaker of the day, Prof. I. V. Neprash, director of the Russian Missionary service, bring a message of challenge. Nine members of his family have suffered martyrdom. He was exiled.

During the morning Rev. Kenneth B. Daniels, state colporteur, led the devotional period. Rev. Gerald C. Dryden, Grass Valley, preached the annual sermon, "Awake and March Forward," Mr. Hansen, chairman of the board of deacons of Hinson Memorial church Portland, spoke on "Things the Church Must Do" and Prof. Neprash on Russia. In the afternoon Rev. Lloyd T. Anderson, Burns, president of the Oregon State B.Y.P.U., led the devotional service. Prof. Neprash spoke, and Rev. W. T. Mugford addressed the association on "The Church is Action." Rev. Alfred Danielson of Bend preached on "Our Three-fold Sanctification." The Russian leader brought his third and final word at the evening service.

Music for the sessions was provided by Miss Ellen Cox, Nora and Harry Stearns and Robert Tapp.

Association officers elected were Rev. Mr. Anderson, moderator, Mr. Millholland, Redmond, vice moderator, Miss Stearns, Prineville, secretary-treasurer. Mrs. Danielson of Bend was re-elected president of the women's group. Delegates were present from Burns, Bend, Redmond and Prineville. The Grass Valley women served meals for all.
