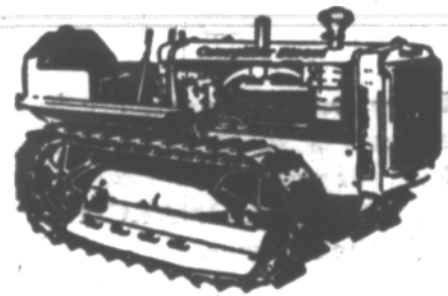
Wasco high school girls have begun volleyball practice.

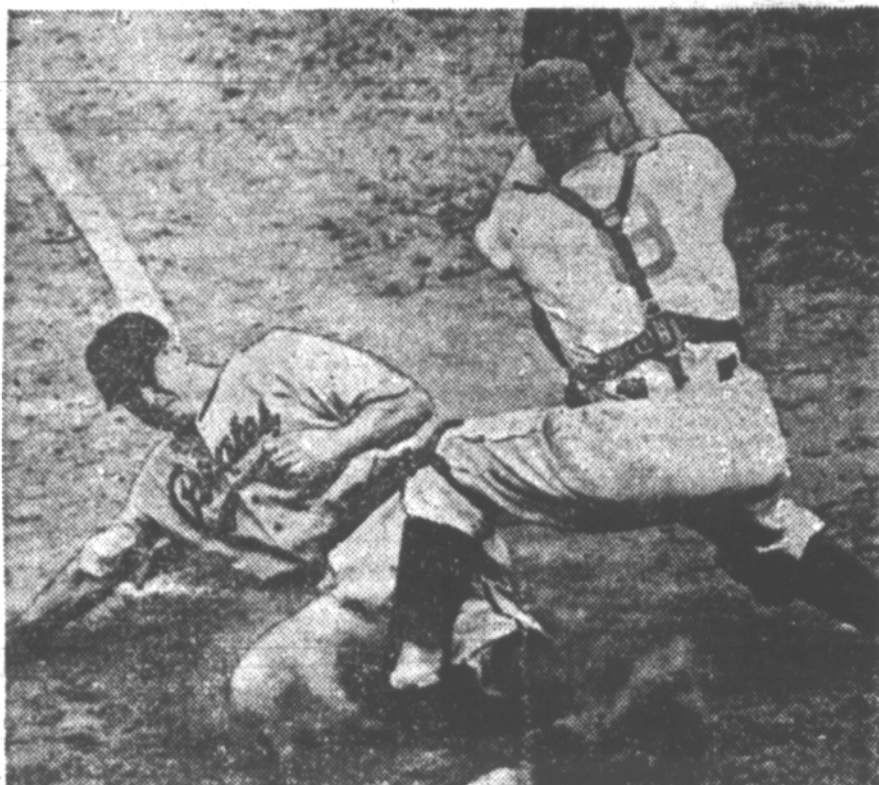

HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

"You're penny wise and pint foolish if you let your family's supply of milk fall below a full quart a day for each child and at least a pint for each adult," is the answer given by Dr. McCollum to the query of young mothers. "Do we really need as much milk as the book says?"

Mothers are more conscientious certainly at the beginning of school than throughout the summer over the day's meal plans. They realize that the vacation has ended not only for the children but for the kitchen as well, and realize also that with the first change of temperature the demand for energy foods will far off-set the interest in the summer's popular choice. The regular hours of school with activity stimulate demands for the food that satiate quickly and lastingly.

Interest with the autumn coloring develops in lima, navy and kidney beans, in spaghetti, macaroni and noodles, and countless members of the starchy family. This is the time when they come in for their yearly consumption, and all too frequently oblivious to the place of milk, vegetables and fruits. Only by each day knowing... and practicing... one quart of milk for each child, and one pint for the adult, at least two

vegetables and at least one fruit... can mothers be sure of controlling healthful balanced meals.

At present markets are changing very slightly but enough to add new interest to the daily order. Grapes are profuse and have their appeal in color and sweetness. Squash are just beginning to absorb stand space, with eggplant and early fall spinach. Green peas and beans, with many tomatoes, are true to their long season. Each combines with milk and eggs to ease the worry on "How do I use the entire amount of milk. It's not how important on how the protective foods are taken in; but it is important that they are present, and 365 days of the year.

Here is a recipe for egg plant soufle - just a bit different.

Eggplant Soufle
Two cups cooked mashed eggplant
Four tablespoons butter
One teaspoon of salt
One and a half cups milk
Two eggs
pepper

Force eggplant through sieve. Add butter, seasoning, milk and beaten egg yolk. Fold in beaten egg whites and place in buttered baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven until firm and lightly brown. Garnish when serving with sliced or small whole tomatoes.

Wheat Market Continue Weak As A Whole

Aside from the unsettled political situation in Europe, the wheat market as a whole continued weak with supplies greatly in excess of indicated requirements and with a prospective carry over at the close of the season nearly as large as the 1934 record. World production outside of Russia and China is forecast now at 4,345,000,000 bushels or approximately 500,000,000 bushels above the 1937-38 harvest. Carryover stocks July 1, are placed at 595 million bushels, giving a total world supply not including Russia and China of 4,940,000,000 bushels. Probable disappearance during the 1938-39 season is estimated at 3,795,000,000 bushels which would leave a carry over at the close of the season next July of 1,145,000,000 bushels or only about 50 million bushels short of the record stocks July 1, 1934.

Foreign wheat markets fluctuated with day to day changes in the European political situation. At the close of the market Sept. 23, prices were slightly lower than a week earlier. The Winnipeg market was barely steady as a result of larger marketings despite a sharp increase in export business. No. 3 Manitoba Northern declined to 59 1/2 cents.
