Farm Income Up Under AAA Program

Farm Income in the United States has continued to climb ever since 1932 until 1937 when the farmers of the nation had twice as much to spend as in the former year. Even in 1938 the farm income of the United States remained about six million dollars above the 1932 level.

The administration farm program has been changed several times in an effort to give a more satisfactory protection to the farmer on his products. It will likely be further changed but will not go back to any discredited plan of subsidized dumping.

Beware of misleading reports of wheat importations. Farm exports were up last year 160 millions above 1936 and 300 millions above 1932.

Farm bankruptcy has decreased more than half since 1933 and Farm Interest rates are one third less than 1932.

The new deal has brought higher wheat prices, lower interest to our farmers. It has brought greater exports and fewer bankruptcies.

Congressman Walter M. Pierce has had an important part in this program. He has been a member of the important Agriculture committee which reviews all farm legislation. He is now the chairman of the wheat section of that committee. Wheat growers must not be misled by any political Judases. Vote for a continuance of recovery and a more sympathetic national administration.
