### Non-High Board Makes Budget

The budget board of the non-high school district met Wednesday night to make levies for the coming year. Because there is over \$3000 on hand the budget was reduced again this year with the result that tax payers will be asked to provide but \$4238 for educating and transporting non-high pupils to high schools.

This budget has been reduced consistently for a number of years starting at over \$10,000 when the number of pupils was greater and the business was not organized. Non payment of warrants for a few years caused a deficit that had to be made up. Since taxes have been paid more regularly of late years there has been a decrease in the budgets of this board.

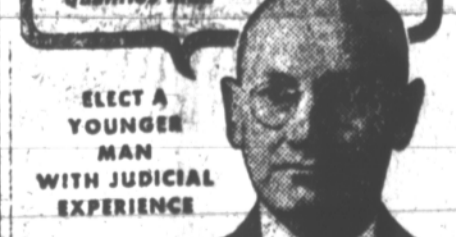
