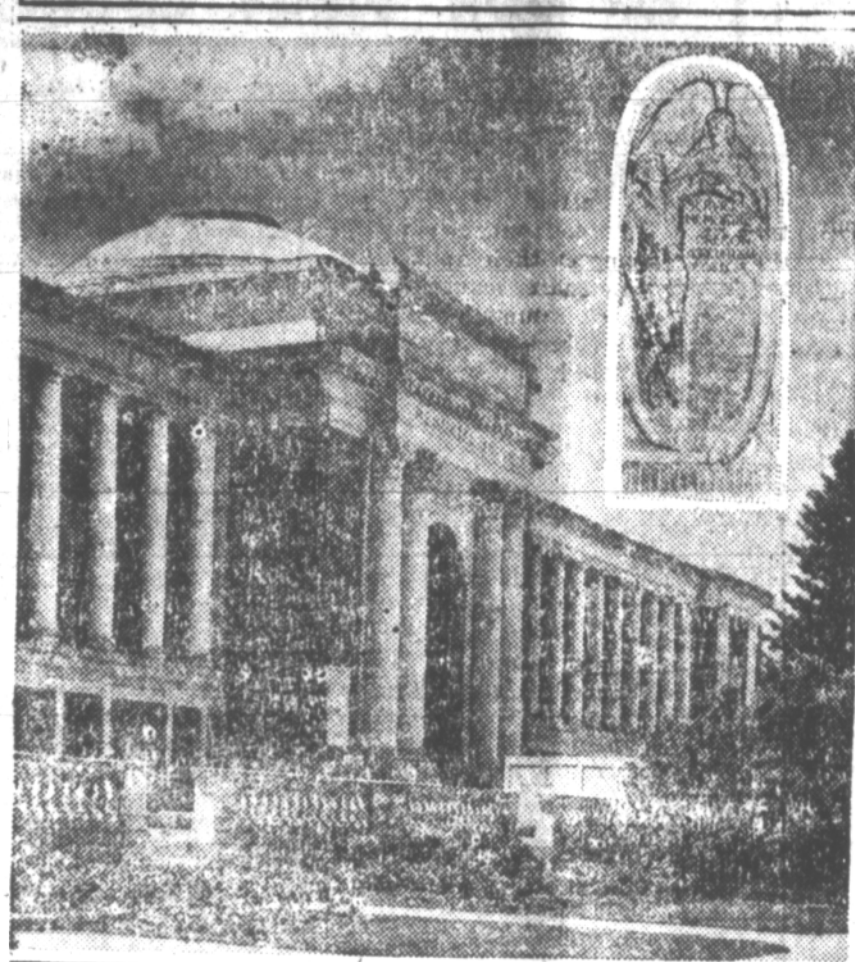

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—The twentieth anniversary of the signing of the armistice finds the Memorial Union building here completing its tenth year of service to the campus and the state.
