THE GRANGE PROGRAM

National Master Tabor Tells How to Build Rural Prosperity.

The Grange program for rural betterment has always been specific and workable: Never more so than set forth by Mr. Tabor, in these definite steps called for in the present grave emergency:

1. Give the American farmer the American market on all crops which he can efficiently produce.
2. Develop new markets and new uses for food and fiber products.
3. Maintain our share of the foreign markets on those commodities that we have long produced for export.
4. Set aside all tariff revenues on agricultural products to use as a drawback to aid in exporting farm products, or equalizing tariff costs.
5. Continue and increase appropriations for research laboratories.
6. Reduce production costs by keeping transportation, interest and other fixed charges at a reasonable level.
7. Check the continued increase of debt and taxes.
8. Develop a sound program that increases the forestry, wild life and conservational use of land. Remove marginal and sub-marginal land and bring no new acreage under cultivation until needed.
9. Increase support and assistance for cooperative marketing methods.
10. Continue adequate appropriations for agricultural education, experimentation, extension, 4-H Club work, vocational agriculture and rural school activities.
11. Hasten business recovery and increase purchasing power.

Saddle Names Change

Western saddles were identified under the general terms of "cow saddles," "range saddles," or "stock saddles," while in the East such saddles were called "Mexican" saddles, "cowboy saddles" or "Western saddles." The earlier Western saddles had large, flat "horns" on the pommel and were short, flat and clumsy. Such saddles were slangily called "dinner plates." The saddles of the 1880's were called "apple horns" because their horns were approximately round and about the size of an apple. After the 80's saddles improved and became adapted to certain particular uses. Variations in the saddle "tree" or frame created special names, and today the various types of saddle include the "Brazos, California, Nelson, Frazier, Oregon, Visalia, Cheyenne, White River, Ellenburg," and "Hamley."

THANKSGIVING DINNER

With all the changes in our knowledge and ideas regarding diets in recent years, bringing them up to date as far as nutritional standards, food preparation and service is concerned, there is one feast that has withstood the years with very little change. This is Thanksgiving dinner, probably the most traditional (and certainly the most typical) of all American feasts.

The turkey, the cranberry, the pumpkin on the Thanksgiving menu are almost as traditional as the day itself. With the dinner essentially the same as in our grandmother's day, and served year after year to the same family group, the surprising thing is that we approach it each year with just as much enthusiasm. The wise homemaker knows that although the pattern is a set one, this does not keep her from expressing her own ingenuity. There is always plenty of room for originality in new and interesting combinations

using old favorites.

Whether the meat course is turkey or chicken, duck or goose, or a roast of some type, stuffing is a part of the unwritten Thanksgiving tradition. A decided difference of opinion governs the type of dressing for some like a moist and some like a dry dressing. In either case, melted butter is added to the bread for richness and for flavor. If possible, fry the seasoned dressing mixture in butter, using a large skillet for it. The stuffing is then put into the bird or roast piping hot. You will find this not only speeds up the roasting but also improves flavor.

If you like a nut stuffing, using blanched walnuts or filberts carefully browned in butter makes a pleasing change. The addition of mushrooms, too, will make a delicious and different flavor. Allow a pound of mushrooms to every quart of crumbs. To get the full flavor of the mushrooms, fry them in butter for five or ten minutes before adding them to the crumbs. Whatever flavor variation you make, remember the stuffing swells

as it cooks, so do not pack it into the bird but give plenty of room. And now with the turkey carefully stuffed and trussed, rub the outside of it with a creamed mixture of one and a half tablespoons selt, 5 tablespoons butter and two tablespoons flour. This will assure a lovely brown as well as an improved flavor. Another way to achieve a superior flavor in the

turkey is to pour melted butter over the roasted bird and sprinkle on the salt just before the platter is carried to the table. After all, a feast is as much a matter of flavor as it is of food, so let your own ingenuity go to work on this year's Thanksgiving dinner.

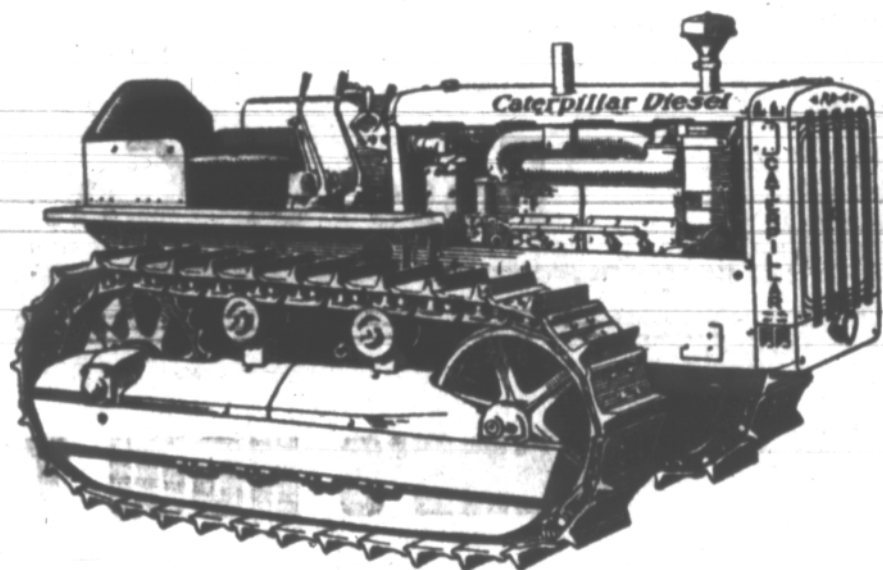
