Planning Board Hopes For More Game Reserves

Pressure in wild life has been heavy during the past twenty years, according to studies by the State Planning Board, and the result, in spite of Oregon's restocking program, has been a downward trend of the resource. The number of licenses sold in the last two decades has increased 50 percent.

The current trend toward shorter hours and fewer working days, coupled with excellent roads, reaching out into areas that were once inaccessible, is increasing the strain on an already overtaxed resource.

Winter range limitation, dams, irrigation, water power, reclamation, industrial and municipal pollution, diseases, and predators, have reduced the resource much more than has the sportsman. The sportsman has been willing to accept the restrictions, but the other abuses have not been very successfully controlled. If interested groups would support the conservation of wild life, such menaces could be controlled.

Nearly all forms of wild life, fortunately, are exceedingly tenacious against mistreatment by mankind. They have the intelligence and the adaptability to withstand adversity. Because wild life is the product of land and water, the ownership, use, and management of the land and water forms the basis for sound planning for the conservation, restoration, and utilization of the resource.

There is scarcely any other resource that will respond so rapidly to scientific management, since it works with nature, nor produce such immediate results, with a minimum of capital, labor, and material expended.
