## Three Girls Outstanding In Club Work

### HONOR 4-H COOK



JANE WALBORN, 18, of Portland, named by State Club Leader H. C. Seymour as one of Oregon's delegates to the 17th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago opening November 25, for outstanding work in food preparation, is a four-year club member. She completed 13 projects in which she prepared 163 special dishes, 469 meals, 375 dozen cookies, 128 cakes, 286 loaves of bread, 85 biscuit bakings and 50 bakings of rolls. She took part in 24 public demonstrations and two "dollar dinner contests", and entered 12 judging contests. She will compete with other state winners from the Western Extension Section for one of two Electrolux refrigerators given by Serval, Inc. and also for national scholarship awards provided by the same firm, of \$400, \$300, \$200, and \$100.

### TO 4-H CONGRESS



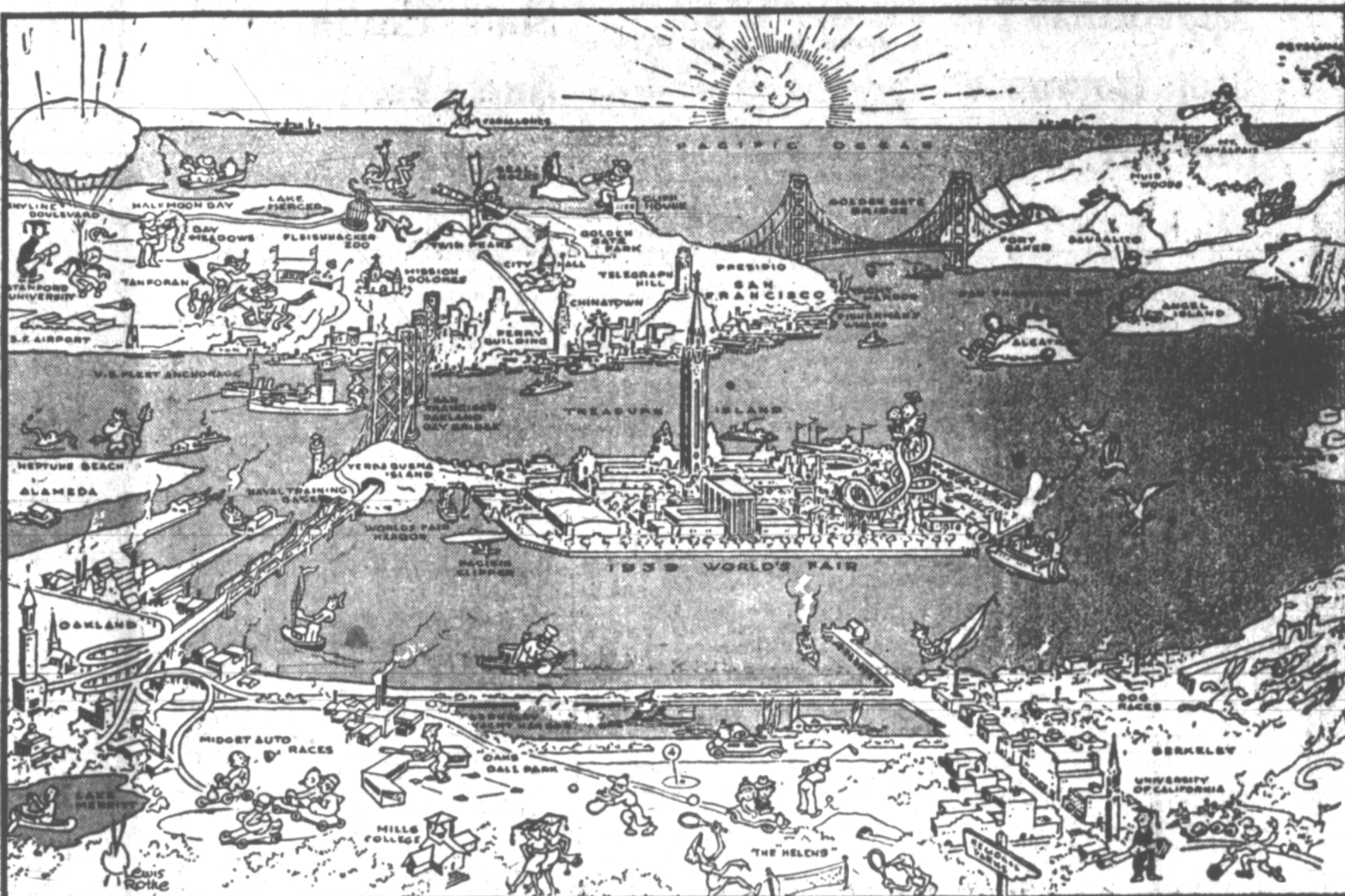
OREGON'S "all-around" 4-H Club girl, Mary L. Armstrong, 18, of Portland, named by a State 4-H Committee to receive an all-expense trip to the 17th National 4-H Club Congress opening November 25 in Chicago, has a superior six-year record. She completed 19 projects in which she made 64 garments, prepared 110 meals, baked 222 times, fixed 208 new dishes, canned 342 pints of fruits and vegetables, and 193 jars of jellies and other products. She gave 28 public demonstrations, entered 17 judging contests, 20 style revues and was county health champion two years. On 49 exhibits she won \$47.50, and her club projects have a total value of \$343.92. At the Chicago Congress a champion will be named from each Extension Section and the four with a fifth high ranking state winner at large will receive college scholarships of \$400, \$300, \$200, \$150, and \$100, provided with trips and county awards by Montgomery Ward in supporting the contest for the sixteenth consecutive year.

### 4-H CANNING WINS



FRANCINE SHARP, 16, of Clackamas is one of the Oregon delegation to the 17th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago opening November 25. Awarded by a State 4-H Committee to the state's most worthy 4-H'er in canning projects, the trip climaxes a six-year record. She completed 30 projects in which she canned 2,497 pints of fruits, vegetables, jams and jellies, and meats, gave 15 public demonstrations, and made 111 exhibits to win \$213.85 in cash prizes. The total valuation placed on her project work is \$1,149.75. Miss Sharp will compete with other state winners in the Western Extension Section for a \$200 scholarship. A national winner, chosen from the four sectional champions, will receive an additional \$200 provided by the Kerr Glass Company with state trips and county medals.

#### Kitchen Parties

Now that we have feasted on turkey with trimmings, and have made the most of the leavings even to the last bone in a delicious turkey soup, thoughts of further hospitality may seem very remote. But this is the season for all types of entertaining and for all ages, too.

If you are looking forward to special guests or puzzled over all-of-a-sudden parties, or just what to serve for the drop-in friends and neighbors, you'll have no qualms whatever if you plan your entertaining in the kitchen. No, this isn't a new idea. Our grandmothers found out long ago that the friendly warmth of the kitchen range, the glow of the lamp light, and the medley of fragrances from the pantry made the kitchen the center of all hospitality.

And so it is today... most good times have a way of "ending" in the kitchen. In looking for some thing to serve, remember there is nothing more versatile than waffles. Everyone likes them, they are easy to make, and they are satisfactory from the standpoint of food values because they are full of good things as eggs, milk, and butter. Too, there are many interesting variations to the standard waffle. For instance, adding one eighth teaspoon each of cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice to the dry ingredients will produce an interesting spiced waffle. Served with blocks of golden butter and strained honey it becomes a waffle, glorified.

Cheese waffles are made by adding 1 cup of grated cheese with the egg whites. Serve these with creamed fish or frizzled dried beef

in cream. They are delicious. One fourth cup uncooked sausage meat or chopped or deviled ham sprinkled over each waffle just before baking offer interesting variations.

Waffles may be used in place of the usual toast or crackers for cheese rarebit for a late supper. Yes, waffles may be used as desserts, too. This chocolate waffle, topped with icecream and a chocolate sauce, would be a favorite at any type of party.
