Oregon Accident Toll Drops For October

Good news for all Oregon drivers is contained in the report on automobile accidents in this state during October, released today by Secretary of State Earl Snell.

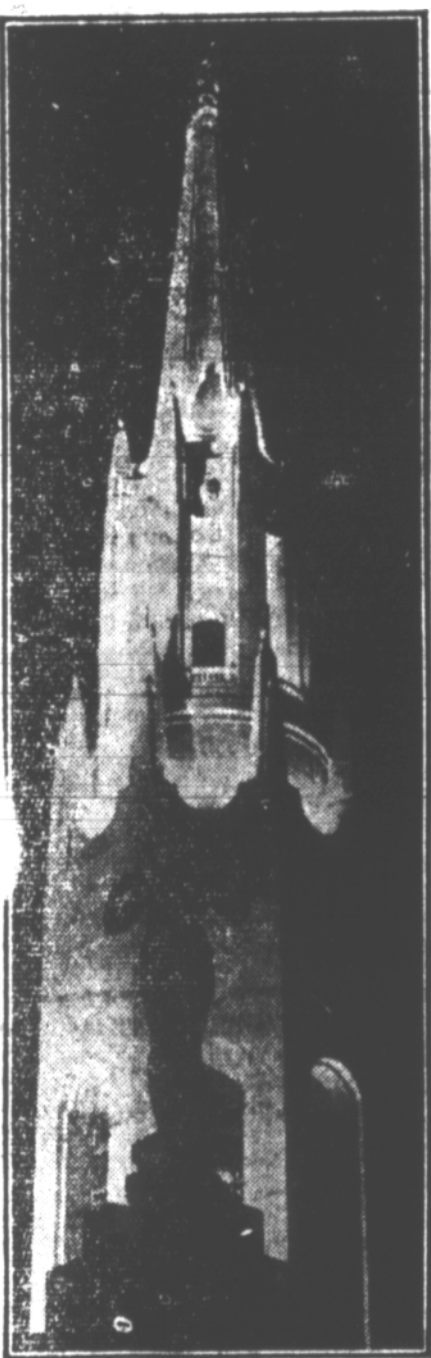
From a total of nearly thirty-four hundred a year ago, reported accidents this October dropped to less than twenty-nine hundred, or 15 per cent; injuries resulting from these accidents dropped exactly one third, while highway fatalities declined 30 per cent.

On October 19th, Jefferson county suffered its first current fatality in more than 23 months, snapping the state's second longest current fatality-free period. Wheeler county, which has not seen a traffic death since February, 1936, boasts a record of three years without a fatal mishap.

Jefferson county's record was broken when Coleman Queen, a resident of Anacortes, Washington, fell asleep at the wheel of his automobile and allowed it to leave the highway about six miles north of Madras. The machine collided with a power pole, and Queen was injured so seriously that he died a few hours later.

Effort Made To Bring More Tourists Here

Through the program just adopted by the Oregon State Highway Commission intensified effort will be made through 1939 to bring added tourists to Oregon, particularly motorists who through the gasoline tax help to build and maintain the state's highways. Magazines, newspapers and motion pictures will be employed to carry the story of Oregon's attractions to the nation.

According to the best estimates available to the Travel and Information department of the Highway commission through which motor tourist traffic promotion is carried forward, about 4,000,000 persons (exclusive of California residents) will attend the Golden Gate International Exposition at San Francisco in 1939. Special effort will be made to reach as many as possible of these 1939 travelers before they start for San Francisco with the objective of including them to include Oregon in their western itineraries.

In the leading magazines of the nation the state's premier attractions, such as its seacoast, mountains, lakes, forests and other gifts that nature gave Oregon will be presented in compelling advertisements all using photographs some of which will be in natural color. More than two score major newspapers in the northern section of the United States and Canada will tell the same story. The advertisements will not only be designed to fill the reader with a yearning to see this state but will invite him to send for detailed, comprehensive booklets on Oregon prepared by the Highway department.

Where safe driving is concerned horse-power under the hood is less important than horse-sense behind the wheel, Secretary of State Earl Snell declares. He says the human element is the deciding factor in all but a handful of accidents, and that mechanical defects and road conditions play a minor part.

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Riding bicycles two abreast on the highway is extremely dangerous, and is a violation of many city ordinances, Secretary of State Earl Snell says. Bicycles are subject to the same traffic regulations as automobiles, and therefore should be ridden at the right-hand edge of the pavement.

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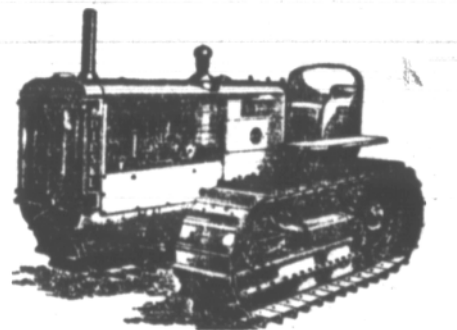
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
