Tumalo Once a Boom Town

Railroads and irrigation led to the founding of many central Oregon boom towns during the first decade of the twentieth century, according to data obtained by WPA writers' project. Lured by the promise of rich agricultural returns, towns were platted, flourished for a brief time, only to be deserted when sufficient water was not available or railroad construction was too long delayed.

Blunders were inevitable during those pioneer days of reclamation, because work was undertaken by private ditch companies with little or no knowledge of irrigation construction costs. There were few laws for the protection of either the settlers or the irrigation interests. Then the plan of eager speculators proved impractical, work was abandoned and the new settlement died.

Laidlaw, typical of these boom towns that might have been the metropolis of central Oregon instead of Bend, still survives under the name of Tumulalo. When founded in 1904, Laidlaw was the headquarters of the Three Sisters Irrigation Company, later the Columbia Southern Company, and had promise of being located at the conjunction of at least four railroads.

By 1905 Laidlaw, a busy town of several hundred people, swarmed with irrigation construction men and bustling settlers with money to spend. Blundering and delay in getting the water onto the land and the discovery that only a small amount of the platted land could be reclaimed blighted the town. Then came the final blow.
