free from traffic deaths after having a perfect seven years record broken by two fatalities during 1937. Police said accidents within the city dropped nearly six per cent during the year.

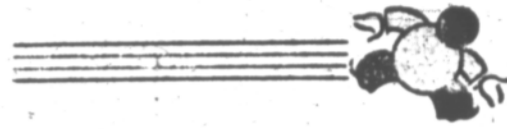
Eugene police reported a 36 per cent decline in accidents during 1938 as compared with 1937, although there were two fatalities in each year.
