HI-WAYS TO HEALTH

No matter what the weather or the season of the year, it takes a dessert to bring a dinner to a happy ending for most of us. Desserts must receive attention in the planning of the meal. You have, no doubt, experienced sitting thru a hearty main course and an equally substantial dessert, and hearing the resulting groans around the table. So learn to fit dessert into the mood and pattern of your meals - a light dessert for a hearty meal, a heavy top-off for a light meal.

Puddings, especially the ones served hot, are among the most filling of all desserts. Some puddings are complete in themselves. But others taste best served with a sauce. With steaming hot plum pudding, hard sauce made from butter, powdered sugar, and flavoring is perfect. Bread or rice puddings are good with cream or a maple sauce, and plain or whipped cream should top the corn-starch mixtures. After all, it's a matter of your own favorite combination of flavors.

We often serve ice cream with a hot sauce, but did you ever try a hot pudding with a cold sauce? Apple and Cranberry Betty

Four cups bread crumbs, lightly packed
Three large green apples
One cup brown sugar
Three fourths teaspoon nutmeg
Three tablespoons butter
Two cups cranberries

Brown the crumbs in a moderate oven (350 deg.) In a casserole place a layer of sliced apples, add one half the sugar and nuts, meg and dot with butter. Add one half the bread crumbs and a layer of cranberries. Repeat, ending with crumbs. Dot with butter. Bake one hour in a moderate oven. Serve hot with dessert sauce. (Serves 6)

Dessert Sauce
One egg white
One half cup powdered sugar
One egg yolk
One half cup whipping cream
One teaspoon vanilla
Few grains salt

Beat sugar into stiffly beaten egg whites. Add beaten egg yolk, whipped cream, vanilla and salt (Serves 6).

Steamed Apricot Pudding
One half pound dried apricots
One and a half cups sifted flour
One fourth cup butter
One half cup sugar
Two eggs
Two teaspoons baking powder
One fourth tsp salt
One half cup milk

Wash the apricots, chop fine and mix with two tbsps of flour. Sift the remaining flour with the baking powder and salt. Cream the butter, add sugar and well beaten eggs, and add alternately with the milk to sifted dry ingredients. Stir in apricots. Pour into buttered mold, cover, and steam for two hours. Serve hot with hard sauce.

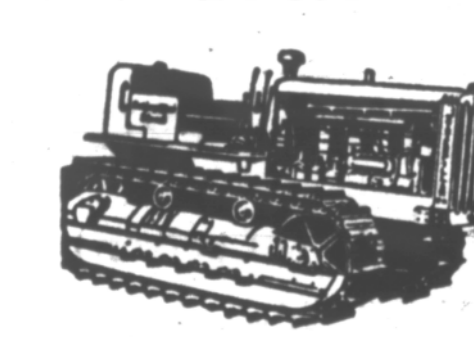
