Private Industry Absorbs Many Job Seekers

Private industry absorbed 54 per cent of the 2905 Oregonians placed in jobs by the Oregon Employment Service during February, according to the monthly report received by the state unemployment compensation commission. This was a gain of 10 per cent over January, but the total placements were 11 per cent less than the previous month.

The decrease was accounted for in the loss of placements in public construction, officials pointed out. Only 36 per cent of the total went into this division, as against 51 per cent in January. Lumber manufacturing showed the best record for the month, jumping 3 per cent to 16 per cent of the state total. Personal services took ten per cent, governmental service, 8 per cent; and agriculture, 7 per cent.

The Dalles, covering Sherman, Wasco, Gilliam, Wheeler, and Jefferson counties, accounted for 160, or 51 per cent, of the state total.

Fourteen per cent of the February jobs went to women, while veterans took 8 per cent of the positions filled by men.
