Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Collins visited Mrs. Collins' parents in Pasco, Washington over the weekend.

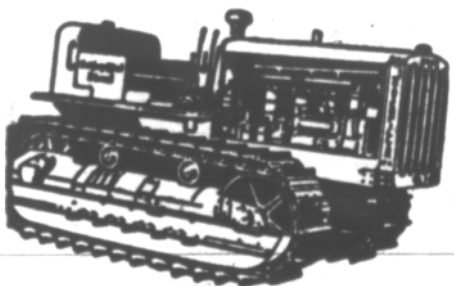

Banishing Spring Fever

Of all the months in the year, March seems to have the worst reputation. When it gets around to March most of us are tired of winter and impatient for the first warm breezes of early spring. With the bits of sunshine that break through we begin to feel the first glimmering of what our grandmothers called Spring Fever.

But spring fever, at least the kind our grandmothers dosed with sulphur and molasses, should be a thing of the past. With the markets bulging with a wide variety of fruits and vegetables and dairy products all during the year, there is little reason for not getting enough of the important vitamins and minerals. It is lack of these over the winter months, you know, that causes the symptoms known as spring fever.

But even with plenty of these right foods - the protective foods, there is a restlessness that comes with March. We are tired of the things we have, the things we've been doing, the foods we've been preparing. So spring clean your menus as well as your cupboards and give your family a surprise of some sort and something different to eat when dinner is ready.

Just dressing up some of the most familiar foods is fun and often more novelty is all that is

needed to revive languid appetites. Carrots for instance - have you ever tried them baked whole in their skins? Scrub them well, arrange in a well buttered baking dish, dot generously with butter and seasoning, and bake in a hot oven until done. You may serve lemon butter sauce with them, which is made by melting three tablespoons of butter to one table spoon of lemon juice. Pour the sauce over the baked carrots just before serving.

An every day crisp salad may be made into a masterpiece by an interesting dressing. Our favorite fruit salad dressing is made by blending one package of soft cheddar cheese with one small glass of currant jelly and then folding in 1 cup of whipped cream. And for those tired of the usual mayonnaise on their salads, we suggest a sour cream dressing for a change. Another dressing, one that will improve any salad, is made by adding one half cup of mayonnaise, a bit of lemon juice, mustard and paprika to one cup of thick buttermilk.

And these are but a few of many suggestions that could be made for March appetites - the main thing being to include an abundance of the protective foods, milk and other dairy products, fruits and vegetables, and serve them in new and interesting ways.

A record breaking year for motor vehicle travel in Oregon seems a reasonable prospect for 1939, in view of the shaping up of statistics for the early months of the year, according to Secretary of State Earl Snell. Here are some of the factors involved in the prediction:

More automobile license plates have been sold than during any similar period on record. Up to March 8, 311,000 1939 license plates of all types had been attached to Oregon vehicles, topping last year's figure on the same date by approximately 10,000.

Gasoline sales during January showed a substantial increase over the preceding January, which was a record breaking month.

The number of licensed drivers on June 30, when present licenses expire, will be more than 50,000 above the former high mark set in June, 1937.

Registration of non-resident motorists, in the doldrums during most of the last year, showed signs of snapping out of the slump during February, which was the second highest February on record. The San Francisco exposition is expected to be a stimulating factor in this respect.

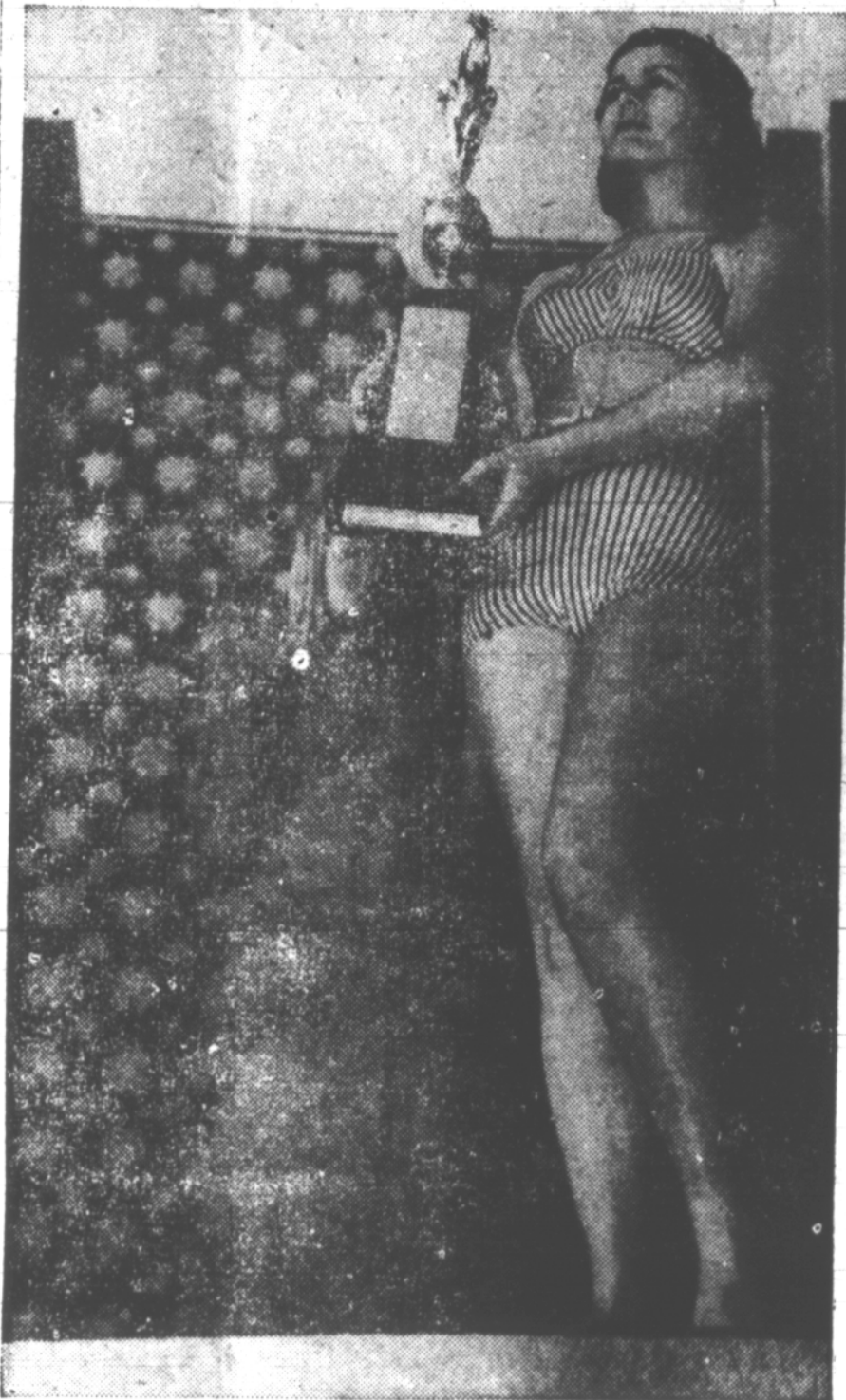

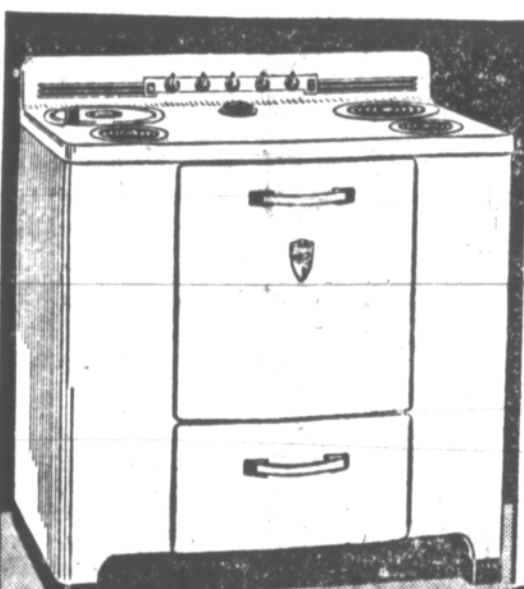
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MEDICINE MAN
