VPJUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW IN APRIL

San Francisco, Mar. 23—One of the best judges in the West will award the premiums of the Twelfth Annual Interstate Junior Livestock Show when some 1700 members of the Future Farmers of America and 4-H Boys and Girls Clubs gather at the Grand Hotel April 2-10.

With more than 5000 head of baby beef, lambs and hogs entered, the show will be the biggest junior exhibition ever held in the United States. Owing to the size of the California coliseum at the Golden Gate International Exposition, it will be possible for 10,000 spectators to witness the judging of all three divisions of the show in the big arena at the same time.

The judging of all animals will start Monday morning April 2nd at 10 o'clock. The baby beef division will consist of approximately 900 head of choice Herefords, Shorthorns and Angus cattle. They will be judged by John C. Burns of Fort Worth, Texas one of the outstanding livestock authorities of the Southwest.

The size of the show has necessitated holding the sale on two days instead of one. A. W. Thompson of Lincoln, Nebraska, nationally known auctioneer, will conduct the sale of beef cattle on Thursday, April 6th and the sale of lambs and hogs on Saturday April 8th.

Four Sherman county beef calves are entered in the show.

Scholarships To Be Awarded 70 Students

Scholarships amounting to \$64,500 each, which will cover the cost of major fees for three terms, will be awarded to 70 students who will attend the University of Oregon next year, it was announced by Earl M. Pallett, registrar.

An opportunity to obtain 40 of the scholarship awards will be open to students who have never before attended an institution of higher learning, it was stated. The remaining 30 scholarships will be given to students already registered in the university.

The selection of recipients will be based primarily on need, and the high school or collegiate

scholastic record of the application forms, which have been sent out to high school principals throughout the state, must be returned by April 1.

The awards will be announced in May, Dr. Pallett said. Applications from graduate and undergraduate students now attending the university will be due June 1.

Anyone who has graduated from high school and who has not attended any other college will be eligible to apply for one of the 40 non-student awards available.
